

Mounted Police Set Performance

Farmington Township Mounted Police in action will be a major feature of the Founders Festival Horse Show set for Saturday at 1 p.m. The Mounted Police will have the place of honor at the head of the grand entry procession, followed by Farmington's 4-H Club, Lion Chabelleros.

A trophy and citation for community service will be presented to the police by the Farmington Masonic Temple Association, which is sponsoring the horse show.

The Mounted Police organization was established a few years ago under the direction of Sgt. John Polder of the township police force.

Since then, the riders have participated in parades all over this area and have also served the community in searches for lost children, rescue work and crowd control. They form a unit of the auxiliary police force.

Family Farm To Survive

Despite bigger investments and greater demands for efficiency, the family farm will persist as an efficient production unit in the future, according to John Doneth, Michigan State University agricultural economist.

Doneth says there will be an increase in farm partnerships, particularly family partnerships, to allow young farmers to get started and to expand their production units. The family is expected to provide the young farmer with the best potential source for capital, but other lending agencies will be more willing to lend, too.

Jaycee Auxiliary Offers Health Checkup Opportunity

An opportunity to have a chest x-ray to check for possible tuberculosis, lung cancer, heart conditions and other chest abnormalities is being offered to the Farmington Area residents. Blood tests to screen for diabetes will also be offered to persons 21 years of age and over as well as vision and hearing tests.

Persons who wish to be screened for diabetes should have a meal high in starch and sugar approximately two hours before the test and should not eat or drink any fluids in the interval.

Tremendous strides in tuberculosis control during the last decade have drastically reduced the death rate and expelled the tuberculosis sanatoriums but unfortunately, have also resulted in an attitude of complacency among the general public.

Michigan Department of Public Health records show that the number of new cases of tuberculosis reported each year is declining very slowly—only two or three hundred fewer cases each year. At this rate of decline, tuberculosis will be a persistent and costly public health problem for a long time to come in spite of the fact that we have the knowledge and means available to eradicate the disease right now.

According to the Michigan Department of Public Health there were more than 3,000 new cases of TB reported in Michigan in 1966. The public should assume responsibility for controlling tuberculosis by taking part in the public health screening program such as the one that the Jaycee Auxiliary will be conducting during the Founder's Festival.

Every individual should take it upon himself to make sure he is free from tuberculosis and is not unwittingly spreading the disease. Every head of a household should make sure that his family is not infected.

The Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary urges everyone to take advantage of the up-coming opportunity to be checked for possible signs of tuberculosis, lung cancer, possible heart abnormalities, diabetes, emphysema, and defects in sight and hearing—especially those who have not had a physical examination recently.

When the mobile units come to Farmington, don't pass them by. Take a few minutes to protect yourself and your community—have the screening tests.

Farmington Follows New Rule

Although Farmington and Michigan are generally considered part of the Midwest, the city is actually organized along New England patterns. This reflects the background of Farmington's founders.

The New England style of village had a main street for business and several cross streets. Its most distinguishing characteristic was a town square around which churches and community buildings were placed.

By contrast, Detroit had a radial street pattern, like Paris.

Farmington, like New England, grew up with the township form of government—a 36-square-mile unit with a classical annual meeting.

1869 Limits Plagued Travelers

Speed regulations are nothing new to Farmington, which celebrates the centennial of its incorporation with a family-fun-filled three-day Founders Festival July 27-29.

Right along the route of the Saturday parade on Grand River leading into the city, a person caught trotting horses or other animals along the streets or alleys could be fined \$5 if the citizenry was endangered by its excessive speed. That was in 1869.

Also, nearly a century ago, merchants neglecting to clean their sidewalks were obliged to pay the street commissioner which would undertake the cleaning automatically with its own staff. The fine—15 cents per hour.

Horse Show Slated To Benefit Festival
