Although she has never filled out a tax return, one of her main interests is tax law.

Sharrrel Wyatt is finishing her last year of law school at Wayne State — one girl in a class of 37. She was recently elected president of the Michigan chapter of an international woman lawyers fraternity, Phi Delta Delta.

The Michigan chapter of the fraternity includes about 45 members.

In Wayne County, Sharrrel says, about one lawyer in 40 is a woman.

"Of course, there are a lot of women who don't practice," she says, "but I don't make much sense to me, but I guess a lot of women go through law school and then don't take the bar exams."

Sharrrel taught French for three years, two of those in Garden City, before she decided to take up law. Her husband, Ray, had a lot to do with that decision.

"I was taking some education courses at Wayne, but I was bored."

"Then my husband said that I might as well study whatever I was really interested in — and that was law."

"He never did like all of the evening classes when I was working in the schools. In law, at least in private practice, I should be able to adjust my own schedule and be my own boss."

What areas of law are most interesting?

"Criminal law, especially today when this branch of law is in a period of change, is fascinating. It may seem strange, but I'm also interested in tax law."

"That was one of my toughest courses but I really enjoyed to like the field. My husband gets a big kick out of that. I never have filled out a tax return myself, and I guess he's not sure I could."

This year Sharrrel will be busy studying for the bar exams next spring. After she is qualified to practice, she is considering teaching or joining a private law practice.

Sharrrel has been a substitute teacher in Livonia during the time she's been attending law school. "In some ways I'd like to be able to combine teaching and law, on a college or community college level."

Her schedule is a busy one, but she seems to have energy and enthusiasm to spare. When this reporter found her, she was waiting for one of the French exchange students who arrived in Observeland last week.

"I thought it would be fun for both of us to see some of this area together," she said.

Sharrrel Wyatt is sure to bring enthusiasm, and a great deal of charm to the attorney at law title which will soon follow her name.
