

Jaycees To Donatelo Pct. Of Profits To Festival

The Farmington Jaycees have voted to contribute 10 per cent of the profits of the various activities sponsored by the group during the Festival to help defray the cost of the three-day event.

The funds will go to the Farmington Board of Commerce which annually underwrites the Festival.

Over the past two years the Board of Commerce has underwritten the Festival by a substantial amount. This year, however, the Festival planners announced that the Board could no longer subsidize the Festival.

In an effort to raise funds the Festival committee scheduled the Founders Festival for June rather than during the Festival. The show was billed as a "benefit" and, while the event was an entertainment success it fell short of reaching the financial goal.

Thus the Jaycees have come through with the offer to help with the financing.

Jaycee activities during the Festival include: a fried chicken booth at the Downtown Center; a duck the Jaycees game next to the chicken booth; and a chicken barbecue on Saturday night at the City Park. Tickets for any of these events and further information may be obtained from any Jaycee member.

Diabetes And TB Checks Offered At Health Service

A diabetes test and chest x-ray screening program will be held in the Farmington Area during the Founder's Festival, July 27, 28, and 29.

If you are overweight, past 21 years of age, or you have a history of diabetes in your family, or are the parents of a baby weighing nine pounds or more at birth, chances are that you may have diabetes and aren't aware of it. Persons in these categories are most susceptible to diabetes.

The exact number of diabetics in Michigan is not known. However, a US Public Health Service survey shows that there are at least nine known cases of diabetes per 1,000 persons throughout the United States, or nearly one percent.

Using this figure as a guide, a conservative estimate of known, diagnosed cases of diabetes in Michigan would be over 50,000. The Michigan Department of Public Health reports that 2,153 persons died from diabetes in 1966.

Numerous screening tests conducted in many areas of the country regularly reveal that for every known diabetic, there is at least one person who either has a mild case or is a potential diabetic. This vast number of active, undiscovered cases of diabetes is annually reflected in our unnecessary high death toll.

Diabetes mellitus, or "sugar diabetes", as it is commonly called is a disease in which the body's ability to use sugars and starches is faulty. Eventually, the amount of sugar in the system builds up because the body is unable to turn it into energy or store it. When this happens, usually large amounts of it are carried in the blood, and much of it is passed out of the body in the urine.

Diabetes cannot be cured, but it can be controlled; when it is detected early enough, it may not even be much of a handicap.

The screening program will be conducted from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., and 4 p.m. to 8 p.m., all three days of the Festival at the Downtown Farmington Center.

Those persons who wish to take the Diabetes test are advised to eat a meal heavy in starch and sugar two hours before the test.

The Diabetes and Chest X-ray screening program is being sponsored by the Farmington Jaycee Auxiliary with the cooperation of the Michigan State Department of Health.

SATURDAY night's square dance is sponsored by the City of Farmington.

Set for 9 p.m. at Downtown Farmington Center, the dance will feature Harley Woods as caller. He has agreed to donate his time.

The dance is open to everyone, and there is no admission charge.

A COMMUNITY-wide two-in-one dance will be held in Demery's Center parking lot Friday night.

Sponsored by the Farmington Township Police Association, the community dance will provide two bands, the "Us Guys," and George Alfano's quartet.

The Township Police hope that by employing two bands they will be able to keep two generations happy.

The community dance is free and is planned to last from 9 p.m. until midnight. In case of rain, the activities will be shifted to O.E. Dunkel Junior High School, on 12 Mile Rd.

McDonald Is Festival Speaker

The freshman congressman from the 19th Congressional District is a young man who set his sights on politics early and successfully sought office.

That's probably the fastest way to sum up the career of Jack McDonald, 35, who will speak at the conclusion of the Festival Parade July 29.

McDonald came out of relative obscurity in 1961 to win election as a Republican as supervisor of Redford Township. His win broke a Democratic stranglehold on township offices.

When McDonald left that post in 1966 to go to the U.S. Congress, all of the elective offices but one were in the hands of the GOP.

Prior to his bid for supervisor, McDonald had been the unsuccessful GOP candidate for state representative against incumbent Democrat Harvey Beadle in 1960.

McDonald set his sights on the 19th Congressional seat shortly after the 1964 elections.

During the Goldwater disaster that hit the GOP, McDonald campaigned for and won another term as Redford Township supervisor.

He had watched the GOP primary battle in the newly created 19th District and had seen conservative Richard Kuhn emerge the victor over a field of more moderate candidates.

Kuhn went down to defeat at the hands of former State Auditor General Billie S. Farnum.

The Republicans had believed that the 19th Congressional seat was almost certain to go to a Republican prior to 1964.

McDonald started his campaign for the 1968 GOP nomination almost immediately. He was elected president of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors.

The Detroit Jaycees named him the outstanding young man of the year in 1965.

The most important step, however, was to obtain Gov. Romney's backing and that of GOP State Chairman Elly Peterson.

This he obtained and when the 1966 GOP primary rolled around the moderates stayed out of the race leaving McDonald and Kuhn to square off.

McDonald then went on to the general election and rode Romney's coattails into Congress.

In Congress, he serves on the House Committee on Public Works.
