AMENDMENT TO ELECTRICAL CODE ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to amend the Electrical Code Ordinance adopted by the Farmington Township Board on February 11, 1958.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD ORDAINS.

SECTION A. Section 1, of the Farmington Township Electrical Code Ordinance adopted by the Farmington Township Board on February 11, 1958, and effective March 13, 1958, as subsequently amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The 1965 National Electrical Code and the Supplementary Uniform Rules of 1965, shall be amended and made a part of the Township's Building Code.

The following shall apply in addition to all requirements of said Electrical Code and Supplementary Uniform Electrical Rules.

(a) In all institutional, industrial and commercial buildings of masonry and steel construction, all electrical wiring shall be installed in metal raceways.

(b) In all institutional, industrial and commercial buildings of masonry and steel construction, electrical wiring in wooden ceilings and partitions may be installed in Rometek wiring.

SECTION B. Section 2, of the Farmington Township Electrical Code Ordinance adopted by the Farmington Township Board on February 11, 1958, and effective March 13, 1958, as subsequently amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Printed copies of the 1965 National Electrical Code and the Supplementary Uniform Rules of 1965, shall be kept in the office of the Township Clerk, available for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times.

SECTION C. This Ordinance is hereby adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington on the 24th day of July, 1987, and ordered to be published as provided by law. The Ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) days after publication.

Sealed bids for the purchase of 1967 Water Main Improvement Special Assessment Bonds, Series I, to be issued by the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, of the par value of \$600,000.00 will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Public Works of said Township, 550 South Telegraph Road, in the City of Pontiac, Michigan, until 11:00 o'clock A.M., Eastern Daylight Time, on Wednesday, the 9th day of August, 1987, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated April 1, 1987, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 or \$5,000.00 each at the option of the original purchaser, will be numbered consecutively in the order of their maturities from 1 upwards, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 7 percent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of April and October in each year. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1 percent. The interest rate on any one bond shall be at one rate only and represented by one interest coupon for each coupon period, and all bonds maturing in the same year shall carry the same interest rate. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds may be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery. Both principal and interest will be payable at such time and place as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, which paying agent qualifies as one of the Statutory Banks of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government.

The said bonds will mature serially in the amount of \$25,000.00 on October 1 in the year 1987; \$45,000.00 on October 1 in the year 1988; \$40,000.00 on October 1 in each of the years 1989 through 1992; \$45,000.00 on October 1 in the years 1993 through 1996; \$40,000.00 on October 1 in the year 1997; \$45,000.00 on October 1 in each of the years 1998 through 2000; and \$45,000.00 on October 1 in the year 2001. Bonds maturing in the years 1987 through 1988 are subject to redemption at the option of the township, in direct payment of principal and interest, on any one or more interest payment dates on or after October 1, 1987, at the par value thereof and accrued interest. Notice of redemption shall be given to the holder of such bonds by publication of such notice not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption, of at least one newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Pontiac, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service notices of the sale of municipal bonds. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest for the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem the same.

The said bonds are to be issued in anticipation of the collection of an equal amount of assessments of certain districts, to defray against lands in certain special assessment districts, to defray the cost of constructing water mains in Special Assessment District Nos. 37 to 42, both inclusive, in the Township of Farmington, and in addition will provide the full faith and credit of the township for the payment of the principal and interest thereon. The township's taxing power therefore is without limitation.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from September 1, 1987 to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the township. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$12,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Township Treasurer must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the unsuccessful bidder will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKee & Culp, attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the township. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a non-liability certificate, dated as of the date of the sale of the bonds. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan, or at such other place as may be agreed upon between the township and the purchaser.

The night is required to reject any or all bids. Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposal for Bonds."

Baby Stops Breathing, Saved By Neighbors' Quick First Aid

A Farmington Township baby is alive today because of the quick action of residents on Brandwine and Township Police Officer Melvin Hall last Sunday.

Greg Roberts, 18 months, son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Roberts, Jr., 28337 Brandwine, was at home with his sister, Cathy, 19, while his parents were playing golf at Meadow Brook Country Club.

Mrs. Roberts was playing with the youngster in the front yard when he suddenly stopped breathing. She ran with him to the home of Mr. and Mrs. P.P. Worack nearby.

Mrs. Worack called Township Police and Fire Department while her son, Fritz, 15, applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Another neighbor, Mrs. Silas Ackroyd, also applied resuscitation before Officer Hall arrived on the scene.

He checked by radio with the Fire Department and found that the call to the rescue team had been cancelled.

With no delay, he immediately took Greg to Botsford General Hospital with young

Worack's father applying mouth-to-mouth resuscitation all the way. Whenever resuscitation was stopped, the baby would stop breathing but by the time he reached Botsford he had begun to cry.

Doctors at Botsford could find nothing lodged in Greg's throat, but credit the lack of delay in getting him to the hospital with saving his life.

The parents had called from Meadow Brook to check on things at home and learned of the trouble. They went to Botsford and found that their son was all right.

Mrs. Roberts says that Officer Hall told her, "It was the prettiest sound I ever heard when I heard that baby cry in the car."

19th District Dems Ok New Tax Package

Oakland County Democrats have passed a resolution commending the Democratic members of the Michigan House of Representatives on their successful efforts to provide equity in the new state tax package.

Aldo Vagnoni, 19th Congressional District Chairman, spoke in favor of the resolution. He pointed out that the Republican House plan, as originally proposed and endorsed by Governor Romney, would have provided a family of five people only \$3,000 in deductions. The Democratic plan, adopted by the Legislature, will provide that same family a \$6,000 deduction or a tax saving of \$78 per year.

Vagnoni stated: "The original Republican plan would have shifted the majority of Michigan's tax burden to those paying taxes on personal income while business would have contributed less than 15 percent. Approximately 33 percent of Michigan's tax revenue had previously been derived from business enterprises. House Democrats insisted on a sliding scale property tax rebate which benefits small property owners."

In addition, Democratic House members forced an increase in the business income tax from 5 percent to 3.6 percent. In addition, these measures increased the tax revenue of business to approximately 28 percent. This resolution was jointly submitted by former Democratic State Representative Robert Slingerland, of Orion Township, and Avon Democrat Chairman Leonard Pasnik. Slingerland stated, "The House Democrats and Minority Leader William Ryan deserve a great deal of credit for working so diligently to protect the interests of Michigan's low and average income families."

Seek Stray Cat That Scratched Five-Year-Old
