Sealed bids for the purchase of Oakland County Water Supply Bonds (Farmington Township System—Northeast Section) to be issued by the County of Oakland, Michigan, of the par value of \$2,535,000.00 will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Public Works of said County, No. 550 South Telegraph Road, in the City of Pontiac, Michigan, until 11:00 o'clock A.M., Eastern Daylight Time, on Wednesday, the 9th day of August, 1967, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

Said bonds will be dated May 1, 1967, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the order of their maturities from 1 upward, and will bear interest from their date of a rate or rates not exceeding 5% per annum, payable on November 1, 1967, and thereafter semi-annually on May 1 and November 1. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed as multiples of 1/8th of 1% or 1/20th of 1%, or both. The interest rate on any one bond shall be at one rate only and represented by one interest coupon for each coupon period and all bonds maturing in the same year must carry the same interest rate, which rate shall be not less than 2% per annum. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Said bonds will mature serially on May 1 in each year as follows:

Bonds maturing on and after May 1, 1985 shall be subject to redemption prior to their stated maturity at the option of the County, on any one or more interest payment dates on and after May 1, 1981, or the par value thereof and accrued interest plus a premium on each bond computed as a percentage of the face value thereof in accordance with the following schedule:

3% if called to be redeemed prior to May 1, 1984
2 1/2% if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1984 but prior to May 1, 1987
2% if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1987 but prior to May 1, 1990
1 1/2% if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1990 but prior to May 1, 1993
1% if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1993 but prior to May 1, 1996
3/4% if called to be redeemed on or after May 1, 1996 but prior to maturity.

Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of the bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of New York, New York, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem the same. Bonds maturing prior to the year 1985 shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Both principal and interest will be payable on such bond and/or trust company, qualified under the laws of the State of Michigan or of the United States of America to serve as paying agent, as shall be designated on the original purchase of the bonds. Such purchaser shall also have the right to name a co-paying agent to qualified.

The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring the "Oakland County Water Supply System for Farmington Township—Northeast Section". They are to be issued pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 185 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1937, as amended, in relation to the sale of bonds from amounts to be paid to the County under a certain contract dated November 1, 1966, between the County of Oakland and the Township of Farmington, Michigan, and the Township of Farmington, Michigan, which said contract provides for the sale of bonds to the County of Oakland for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring the "Oakland County Water Supply System for Farmington Township—Northeast Section". The Township is also required by said contract to pay interest on the unpaid balance of such capital cost on April 1, 1969 and semi-annually thereafter in amounts to be determined by the Township in each year to pay the interest maturing in such year on the bonds. Interest payable on the bonds on November 1, 1967 and May 1, and November 1, 1968, is capitalized and is payable from the proceeds of the bond.

The said bonds will be payable as to both principal and interest primarily from the amounts collected from the Township pursuant to the contract. The Township is authorized by said contract obligated itself to make such required payments to the County and to the County is authorized to make such required payments to the Township. In addition, by affirmative vote of 3/4ths of the members of the Board of Supervisors of the County, the full faith and credit of the County is pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds and to provide the necessary funds the County is authorized and obligated to levy a tax on all taxable property in the County without limitation as to rate or amount.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from September 1, 1967, to the date of maturity, and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the County for the purpose of the bonds, or less than all of the bidders, or at a price less than their par value, or which provides for supplemental coupons, will be considered.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$30,700 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the County of Oakland must accompany each bid at a guarantee of good faith and to be furnished by the bidder, to be forfeited as forfeited damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKee & Cutlip (Claude H. Stevens, of Counsel), attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the County. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a non-liquidation certificate, dated on the date of delivery of the bonds. Bonds will be delivered at the office of the Treasurer of the County of Oakland, Chicago, Illinois or Detroit, Michigan. Payment for the bonds shall be made at the closing in Federal funds.

It is the right of the County to reject or accept all bids. Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposals for Farmington Township Water Bonds".

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Vagnozzi Announces For Charter Group

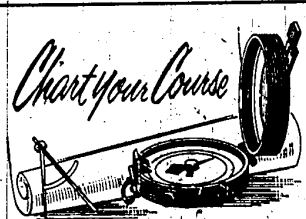
