

City To Hold Blood Drive For Detroit

Livonians are urged to donate blood at an alternate bloodmobile which the Detroit Red Cross has set up in Livonia.

The announcement by Judy Gunther, field representative for the Northwest Service Office, follows:

"Because of civil strife in Detroit, Red Cross bloodmobiles have had to be cancelled.

"As Red Cross is the principal supplier of blood and must meet its commitment to more than 100 hospitals in the five-county area, alternative sites have been chosen to collect blood outside the city limits.

"This is an urgent plea for all eligible donors of the area to support their Red Cross bloodmobile which will be at the Livonia Red Cross sub-center on Thursday, July 27, between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. The address of the northwest office is 31228 Five Mile Road, at Meridian."

Student Apathy Toward College Causes Concern

Dr. Wayne H. Buell, president of the Lawrence Institute of Technology, is concerned because a U.S. Office of Education financed survey shows that approximately 2,000 top ranking June graduates of Michigan high schools have not applied for admission to any college.

Many colleges have room for additional students this Fall including L.I.T. where its new \$24 million dollar Science Building will allow increased enrollment in all of the schools and divisions, he said.

"These students in the Project Memo Report finished in the upper quarter of their classes and certainly are eligible for college," he continued.

He offered a number of explanations:

1. They believe all colleges

are crowded. While this is true of many, there are many more colleges which welcome applications, particularly from top-ranking high school graduates.

2. They believe they have impossible financial problems. Actually, it is easier to get through college today than at any period in history. Most colleges have financial aid officers who are able to help most students in many ways including jobs, scholarships, loans, and, here in Michigan, students attending private colleges are eligible for outright grants towards tuition under the State tuition grant program. Lack of sufficient finances no longer is a valid reason for staying out of college.

3. They desire immediate full-time employment. Here at L.I.T. we have a unique program. A student may elect one of our fully-accredited Bachelor of Science Programs and complete it entirely in our evening college while holding a full-time job during the day. Other colleges, too, offer continuing education programs at night.

Dr. Buell said he believed that many high school graduates are not fully aware of the host of high educational opportunities available to them and urged all to go on to college now.

L.I.T.'s applications for the Fall term are 20 per cent more than a year ago indicating a forthcoming record enrollment of 4,300 students, Dr. Buell said.

He added that L.I.T. currently is geared to handle 5,000 men and women students, a goal that is expected to be reached by 1970.

Room still is available this Fall for students in Bachelor of Science programs in Day or Evening college in Engineering, Architecture, Industrial Design, Chemistry, Physics, and Mathematics.

The L.I.T. Admission's Office is open weekdays, including Summer from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

J. B. Tomlinson Attends Summer Math Institute

Finn, Georgetown University, teaches physics. Dr. T. Felder Dorn, the University of the South, is the Institute director.
