


Youngsters Discover Reading Joy At Flanders

Children taking part in the seven-week summer library program at Flanders Elementary School are taking the first steps to discovering the joy in reading.

They are learning to like books.

They are learning to become independent readers and library borrowers.

The program, open to children from pre-school age through 6th grade living within the Flanders boundaries, has been repeated again this summer through the efforts of the school PTA and the PTA executive board.

It is conducted from 1 to 5 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays in the school library under the supervision of Mrs. Jean Hough, a professional librarian.

Story times are set up when children hear stories read aloud for the 3 to 5 age group, 5 to 6, 7 to 8 and 9 to 15 age groups.

There is a summer book club for youngsters who have completed third through sixth grade, a boys' hobby club and a library art workshop, in which the children make projects about the books and characters they have heard to enjoy.

And books can also be borrowed so that a child in the middle of a good story can take it home to finish and be ready for the next reading adventure.

Eyes Gun Control

Ever since last month's riot in Detroit, a lot of people have been shooting off a lot of guns in Farmington Township.

Supervisor Curtis Hall asked Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan Monday night to do some research on what powers the Township has to control the use of firearms.

Irving Yakes, Township chief of police, said that he had requested that the board pass an ordinance that would stop

people from having target practice in the Township. Yakes said that there have been a lot of requests by out-of-town people to get permission from the police to shoot at targets set up on friends' property.

State law presently prohibits hunting in the Township, Hall said, but there apparently is little to restrict "target" shooting.

Hall said "we're getting to densely populated" to allow target shooting, especially of .22 rim fire rifles which carry half-mile or more.
