DOGS ALLOWED IN WOODS IN DEER SEASON

aw Is Intended to Keep Bird Dogs Out of Those Parts of the Woods Where There Are Deer and Will Be Enforced

Lansing, Mich.—Federal postal inspectors are in Michigan investigating reports that the parcels post system is being used by Wisconnia and Illinois pot hunters in flagrant violation of the game laws of this state, and State Game Warden! W. R. Dates says that if convictions are seeinred some heavy fines may be imposed on the violators.

The laws of Michigan relative to the bunting of partridges provide that a hunter shall not kill more than six partridges in one day, nor shall be lave more than fitteen in his possession at any one time. This years the partridge hunting in the northern counties of the state is the best in many seasons and thousands of birds have been killed.

The new parcels post law seems to have opened a new field, as it has been reported to the state game warden and the postal authorities that partridges are being shipped out of the parcels post. It is claimed that the breasts of the partridges are removed, wrapped in oil paper and placed in a package, generally the size of a shoe box.
