

Fiedler To Return For Pops Concerts

Arthur Fiedler will conduct all of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra's 1968 Cabaret "Pops" Concerts. Eight concerts are scheduled for the 1968 series, which will be given April 17 to 27 in Detroit's Light Guard Armory.

Fiedler, who has been conductor of the Boston Pops since 1910, led four of the Detroit Symphony's Cabaret "Pops" on his first visit to the Orchestra last April.

"We set our sights on obtaining Mr. Fiedler for our full 1968 series at that time," said Symphony general manager Howard Harrington. "He generated a great deal of excitement, and we know he will be bringing some fresh concepts to these programs."

The Symphony inaugurated its Cabaret "Pops" in 1964. Since then it has given eight concerts, over a two-week period, each year at the Light Guard Armory on East Eight Mile Rd. Music by candlelight, seating at tables for four, a festive decor, and the

availability of light refreshments, including beer, wine, and liquor, are hallmarks of the concerts.

Fiedler's programs which have met with enormous success, follow a consistent formula of a selection of symphonic classics, a featured appearance by an instrumental soloist, and a group of pop favorites, always leading into a round of encores. Last the Knife, Batman, I Wanna Hold Your Hand, and TV western themes were among some of the pop specials Fiedler presented to Detroit audiences last spring.

Fiedler, 72 years old, is a native Bostonian. He had been a violinist and then a violist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra before becoming conductor of the Boston Pops. A renowned fire buff, he was awarded an Honorary Fire Chief in Detroit when he appeared with the Detroit Symphony earlier this year.

The performance dates for Fiedler's 1968 appearances with the Symphony are April 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 25, 26, and 27. Tickets will be placed on public sale approximately six weeks prior to the concerts though the Symphony is involved in making special arrangements for groups of 100 or more persons.

Many Detroit organizations utilize these concerts in conjunction with their own fund-raising or entertainment programs, as is done at the Boston Pops and New York Philharmonic "Promenades."

A major U.S. presentation of "Romantic Art in Britain" will be exhibited for the first time at the Detroit Institute of Arts beginning Jan. 9, 1968.

The exhibition, subtitled "Paintings and Drawings: 1760-1860," will present fresh evidence among of the early influence of British artists on attitudes toward life and nature which led to modern art.

It is under the patronage of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and President Lyndon B. Johnson.

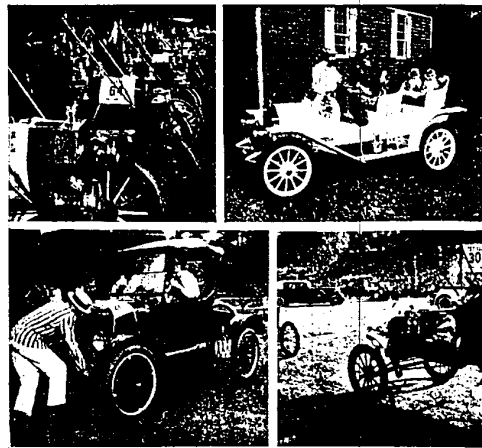
There will be 100 paintings and drawings never before displayed in the U.S.

In addition to the many artists who have not previously been shown in the U.S., the exhibit will feature such acknowledged masters as Gainsborough, Constable, Turner, and Blake.

The exhibit is under the direction of Frederick Cummings of Detroit. Willis F. Woods, director of the institute, said the forthcoming event will be "the most important and original exhibition of English art ever held here or abroad."

Teach Kids Safety, Then Camping

Many accidents to children on camping trips happen because they are faced with situations that are new to them, different from city life.

The Greater Detroit Safety Council, a chapter of the National Safety Council, advises that one of the first things you should do when on a family

camping trip is to walk around the camp area to find any potential hazards; such as streams, ravines, or poisonous plants.

"Then tell the children exactly where they are free to wander and where they aren't to go," says Gerald E. Montgomery, executive director of the Council.

"Don't ignore the children and assume they are taking care of themselves," Montgomery cautions.

"Keep them with you while you set up camp, have them help you, and teach them what they are allowed to do. In short, start turning them into safe, experienced campers as soon as possible."
