

# Work-Jail Plan To Start Soon

Municipal Judge James R. McCann's weekend work-and-jail plan for minor offenders hasn't been discarded — just delayed while details are being worked out by the court, the police and City Hall.

With cooperative matters being worked out, including insurance, the judge expects the program to get underway in a couple of weeks, or by mid-September. It was announced recently as "a break" for volunteers — and their families.

Only minor offenders would be eligible for the "work-jail" plan, outlined by Judge McCann, and already eight have volunteered to pay their penalties by picking up paper and things in the parks and playgrounds under police supervision.

# Schools To Draw 35,000

Vacation time for the nearly 35,000 students who are expected to enroll in Livonia's elementary and secondary schools will end Labor Day week.

The school age population, almost 3,000 above last year's record, will strain the facilities of the 43 schools.

Superintendent Benton Yates said an anticipated 20,475 youngsters from kindergarten through the sixth grade will enroll in the district's elementary schools.

Livonia's junior high schools will have 7,600 in the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades.

The three senior high schools will enroll 6,470 tenth, eleventh, and twelfth year students. This year Bentley, Franklin and Stevenson high schools will share the responsibility as equally as possible for the growing load of teenagers in Livonia.

In 1945 the district had 1,500 students. This year between 34,000 and 35,000 will crowd the schools. By 1971 a school count of 41,000 is predicted.

Yates pointed out that the Livonia voters, in supporting recent \$15 million and \$23 million school construction bond issues, has made it possible to absorb the tremendous increase of school age boys and girls without resorting to city-wide half-day sessions or other devices needed to cope with overcrowded schools in communities where citizen support is less enthusiastic than in Livonia.
