

School Raiders Warning

Student bodies of the two Farmington district high schools were warned Thursday to knock off the campus raids which broke out earlier in the week, before serious consequences result.

Principals Clayton Graham and James Geiger, of North Farmington and Farmington High Schools respectively, addressed the students at their schools after the Athletic Advisory Council had decided the situation was in danger of getting out of hand.

Raiding parties early in the week left the football press boxes of both schools smeared with paint, and school authorities are seeking to quell the outbreak before there is more costly and lasting property damage.

"Some call it boyish enthusiasm, but we call it vandalism," said Graham.

The hooliganism apparently started when some Farmington students sought to interfere with homecoming bonfire preparations at North Farmington last week. In retaliation, a group from North left their mark on the Farmington press box—only to have their own similarly treated the next night.
