Cedar Chest Making Comeback

The cedar closet for summer blanket storage, a "must" for every bride in Grandma's day, does not enjoy the popularity it once did. It is, however, reappearing built-in in homes from coast to coast.

It's no wonder either, because aromatic red cedar has been used to repel moths since Colonial days.

Built-in cedar chests are usually found at the bottom of lines closets or in the attic, although they can be tucked away nearly anywhere.

Measuring about 3-1/2' x 2-1/2' x 3' any home handyman can install one in no time and at very modest cost. Simply make a frame of 2" x 4" lumber and face its interior four sides, top and bottom with red cedar panels. They come tongue and groove for speedy, tight installation.

In contrast, the industry-rich Plymouth School District has a tax base of \$20,000 per pupil and each mill yields \$20 per student.

TEACHERS

What might best be described as "a very healthy atmosphere" now exists between the Farmington Education Association and the Board of Education.

William Kooke, executive secretary of the F.E.A., says "morale is fine among teachers and there's good communication with the board and the administration."

The Farmington Township Planning Commission will give formal consideration to two (2) proposed amendments to the Farmington Township Zoning Ordinance which would rezone property from present classifications to other permitted uses.

1. A further Public Hearing will be held with respect to property located near the northeast corner of North-western Highway and Middlebelt Road, for which rezoning is requested from RA-1 Single Residential District to RC-1 and RC-2 Multiple Residential District. The area to be rezoned RC-2 (approximately ten units per acre) is located immediately to the south of the Middlebelt entrance to Old Franklin Towne Subdivision and is described as follows:

Rezone from RA-1 to RC-2

Part of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 1, T.1N., R.9E., Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, being described as:

Beginning at the West 1/4 corner of Section 1, T.1N., R.9E.; Thence along the East and West 1/4 line of Section 1, due East, 219.81' to the Southwest corner of Lot 108 of Old Franklin Towne (L. 112-R.14, 15 and 16); Thence S. 37 degrees 34' 37" E., 433.20'; Thence 205.51' along the arc of a curve concave to the East, said curve having a radius of 108.0', a central angle of 71 degrees 21' 45", and whose chord bears S. 7 degrees 25' 49" W., 192.48'; Thence due West, 560.47'; Thence along the West line of Section 1, N. 0 degrees 02' 00" W., 425.10' to the point of beginning, subject to the rights of the public in Middlebelt Road.

Containing 4.5633 acres.

The part to be rezoned RC-1 (approximately seven units per acre) is located immediately to the east of property presently zoned for office building uses at the intersection of Northwestern and Middlebelt Roads, and is described as follows:

Rezone from RA-1 to RC-1

Part of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 1, T.1N., R.9E., Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, being described as:

Beginning at a point, said point being S. 0 degrees 02' 00" E., 423.10' and due East, 423.37' from the West 1/4 corner of Section 1, T.1N., R.9E.; Thence S. 0 degrees 02' 00" E., 445.0'; Thence S. 0 degrees 20' 00" E., 142.65'; Thence S. 84 degrees 43' 36" E., 145.0'; Thence S. 48 degrees 11' 00" E., 205.9'; Thence S. 11 degrees 45' 37" E., 241.40'; Thence along the Northernly line of Northwestern Highway (204' wide), S. 48 degrees 38' 30" E., 68.79'; Thence N. 11 degrees 45' 37" E., 310.0'; Thence S. 45 degrees 25' 22" E., 130.16'; Thence S. 8 degrees 56' 05" W., 60.0'; Thence S. 78 degrees 32' 30" E., 125.0'; Thence N. 0 degrees 27' 41" E., 420.34'; Thence S. 88 degrees 22' 30" W., 36.24'; Thence N. 0 degrees 31' 30" E., 421.14'; Thence due West, 245.0'; Thence N. 38 degrees 00' 00" W., 158.0'; Thence 254.62' along the arc of a curve concave to the East, said curve having a radius of 185.0', a central angle of 88 degrees 25' 02" and whose chord bears S. 15 degrees 37' 28" W., 230.10'; Thence due West, 135.0' to the point of beginning.

Containing 10.6623 acres.

The balance of this parcel, including all property abutting present residential lots, is to remain in the RA-1 Single Residential category.

2. Property located in the northwest one-quarter of Section 36, located between Shawwassee and Nine Mile Roads and several hundred feet east of Middlebelt Road, would be rezoned from RA-1 Single Residential District to RC-3 Multiple Residential District. This parcel is approximately 8/10 of an acre and is located at:

26333 West Nine Mile Road, Farmington Township, Michigan.

An person who may be interested is invited to participate in discussion of these proposed changes.

Blue prints and maps clarifying the location of the properties proposed to be rezoned and zoning text may be examined at the Farmington Township Office on any business day between 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M.
