

Legislators Take Vacation Without Open Housing Action

State senators and representatives, called into special session Oct. 10, are back home for a three-week rest. They'll return Dec. 12 to face one of the most controversial issues in years, the open occupancy bill. Passage is slim even though Gov. Romney is pushing for it. Before recessing, the lawmakers passed a state income tax, boosted the cost on gasoline and license plates, and tacked extra fees on such things as parks and fishing licenses.

Following a "conflict of interest" ruling by Attorney General Frank Kelley, Wayne State University Trustee William B. Hall announced his resignation from the Detroit Bank and Trust Company to retain his seat on the University's governing body.

A survey of a Detroit group, the Police Recruitment Project of Michigan, has revealed that three of the State's largest municipal police departments with more than 100 men

have no minority group representation, and that the 1,498-man Michigan State Police has only one Negro state trooper.

American Motors Chairman Roy D. Chapin, Jr., admitted his annual report to the board of directors this week will show a \$70-million loss but said the company appears now to have "turned the corner" on the way to recovery. Some \$20-million a year in overhead has been cut, he said, and AMC's break-even sales level reduced to 275,000 cars, down more than 100,000

units from a year ago.

Detroit and Highland Park have received Federal grants for upgrading of housing, education and health facilities and to research better methods of slum clearance, welfare assistance and the war on crime. Detroit will use its \$274,000 Federal subsidy to find ways to rebuild a nine-square-mile section of the Inner City where more than 140,000 persons "live in poverty, blight, disorder and disease."

his child after an exhaustive search and then fought an 11-month court fight to bring the case to its present status. In the meantime, the mother's maternal rights were severed by court decision and the Appeals Court ruled the natural father has full right to raise his son. A decision is pending.

Various Negro groups have demanded that Kalamazoo's Central High School, with an enrollment of 2,200 students including about 300 Negroes, include Negro girls as cheerleaders and also teach Negro history in classes next fall. The latter has been approved by the Kalamazoo Board of Education.

Several new regulations go into effect for deer and bear hunters this season which opened Saturday and runs through Dec. 3. Booklets issued with licenses cite 22 rifle bans in some areas and prohibit hunting of bear in the Lower Peninsula. The new heavy-paper deer tag regulations are explained. A new rule regarding the use of a light to locate game requires any weapon to be inaccessible. Fleeing from an officer or failing to stop at his signal is a separate offense.

What's The PF In Your Home?

Did you know your basement has a "best corner"? That is, a corner that provides the best protection against radioactive fallout? It's the one with the highest outside ground level, the one with the least amount of basement wall extending above ground. Now, that's something you can easily determine for yourself.

But do you know how much protection against fallout the best corner provides? Likely not, only a scientific evaluation could give you that information. And that's exactly what the Home Fallout Protection Survey is doing for Michigan householders living in one-, two-, and three-family dwellings with basements—evaluating the degree of protection in each home basement, and mailing this confidential information directly to the householder.

IN RESPONSE to Governor George Romney's request, the Office of Civil Defense in Washington arranged for the Bureau of the Census to make this State-wide survey.

The Bureau obtains a few simple facts about the construction of one-, two-, and three-family dwellings. On the basis of this information, a computer at the Census Bureau calculates the Protection Factor (PF) for each individual basement.

Protection Factor is a term used to indicate a certain amount of protection against fallout radiation. For example, a person in a basement corner which has Protection Factor-40 would receive only one-fortieth or 2 1/2 percent as much radiation as he would get if he were

outside and completely unprotected.

The higher the PF, the more protection the basement affords. PF-40 has been established by the Office of Civil Defense as the minimum standard for public fallout shelters. The familiar black-and-yellow fallout shelter sign designates buildings where these shelters are located.

IN ADDITION to providing the PF for the best corner, the computer calculates the PF for the center of your basement. This, in effect, tells you the amount of protection normally found in your entire basement. But what if the PF in your best corner is below 40? The computer calculates how much weight of material should be placed over each square foot above the best corner to bring its PF up to 40.

All of this information comes to you with a Civil Defense booklet suggesting relatively inexpensive measures you can take to increase the radiation shielding in your basement.

And if you want detailed plans for improving the shielding in your basement, mail the postage-free card attached to the booklet.
