

Poverty War A Skirmish

"Arson, looting, and murder have no relation to civil rights, but neither do the riots offer the slightest justification for calling a halt to programs that strike at the evils that breed riots," University of Michigan economist William Haber declared last week.

Speaking to the Michigan Welfare League in Lansing, Haber, dean of U-M's College of Literature, Science and the Arts, said that:

Americans are "too easily discouraged" by setbacks in the campaign against poverty--although the campaign itself is badly inadequate.

"We are not engaged in a war on poverty," he said. "It is only a skirmish."

"Progress will be slow and many of our poverty dollars are going to be wasted. In the long run, however, I am of the view that these expenditures will provide substantial dividends."

PROBLEMS WHICH the poverty program is trying to attack were long in building up, Haber noted.

Since the technological revolution in Southern agriculture

barely 25 years ago, five million Negroes have migrated to the urban North.

Negro teen-agers have increased by 50 per cent in just five years. Unemployment is higher among Negro high school graduates than among white dropouts. Many Negro youths have a better education than is needed for the best jobs they can get.

Negro unemployment runs at twice the rate of white unemployment--and often three or four times as high among Negro youth. As Negroes have moved into Northern cities, whites have moved out--and so has much industrial activity.

"THE NEGRO IN our Northern industrial cities, such as Detroit, has been subjected to increasing isolation from the white community and from available jobs."

Among the solutions, Haber insisted that "the concentration of Negroes in the core areas must be diluted; nondiscrimination in housing laws must be provided to industries to relocate within the inner city and these must be adequate to overcome the economic advantages of suburban location."

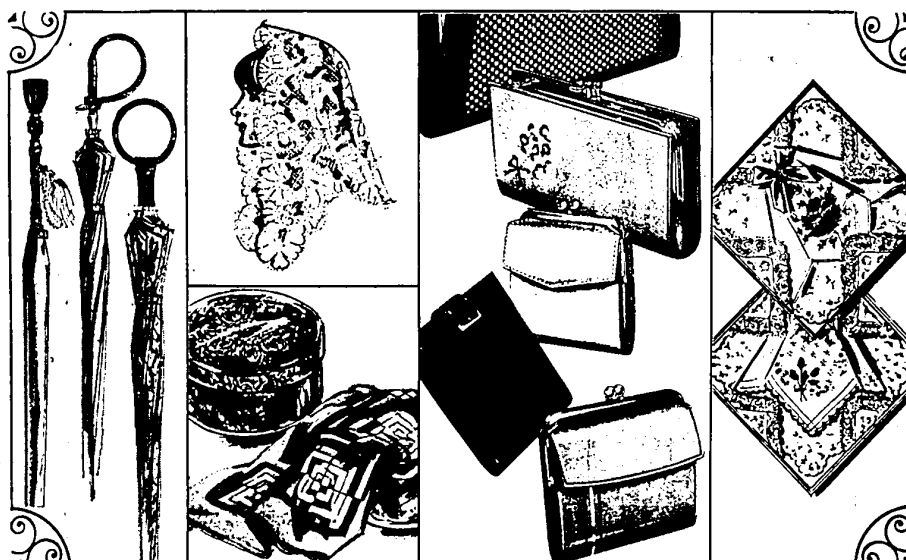
