"Miss Conroy leaves a mother, a sister and three brothers, all but the mother living in the north and unable to attend the funeral. Her sister, Mrs. Ambler, who had spent a large part of the summer here helping to care for her, having had to return home about a week ago."

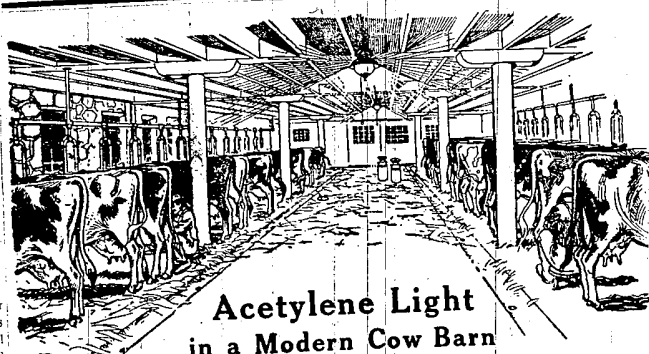

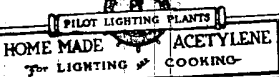
