Housed on the lower level of the school administration building, Mahaney's department channels all the equipment (unless its heavy machinery) needed throughout the school system.

All of the frozen foods for the cafeterias are stored in a room kept at five degrees above zero. No spoilage there. The clay is used by the school's art department.
