We continued on to the famous shrine of Fatima. That night our tour had scheduled a cocktail party followed by a very fine farewell dinner. The last day of our trip had come. Weather was deteriorating but we and our luggage left for a flight home.

Our plane from Madrid circled overhead for more than an hour before returning to Madrid and we went to the Tivoli as guests of TWA. Rain was coming down in torrents with thunder and lightning. We had a beautiful flight across to Kennedy arriving at 4 p.m., only to find no space on any flight to Detroit. Thanksgiving weekend, finally a whisper jet was located and still later a crew to man it. We left Kennedy Airport at 12:45 a.m., reaching home about 4 a.m. Monday morning after a fine trip.

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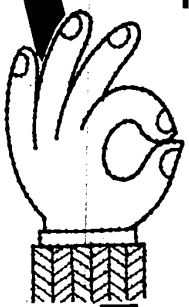


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
