The eight, who were among 60 NFH students who took the exam, are Gary Adams, Kicab Castaneda, Mike Cary, Gary Bartlett, Ken Rosen, Tom Mohr, Bill Marberg and Steve Vagstad.

The competition is a highly sophisticated exam testing the mathematical acumen of the contestants. The eight local finalists were called from 25,000 students representing 215 high schools in the state.

Of these, 600 qualified to take the final examination. Announcement of the top 100 contestants will be made the early part of January.

Pilot Training Class Slated

A ground school course for pilot training will be having the new courses being offered in Farmington schools adult education classes, which begin Jan. 15.

Leroy Hartman, personnel director for the school district and an experienced pilot, will be the instructor. He will cover fundamentals of aircraft structure, aerodynamics, meteorology, pilotage and radio navigation.

The other new courses available include auto mechanics, charm and poise, code for amateur radio, electronics, beginners' German, square dancing, volleyball and wood finishing.

This year there will be additional recreation and health classes, as well as classes on income tax, astigmatism and yoga, standard language, business, fine arts and homemaking subjects.
