Woodcroft Area Will Get Service

The city and township have agreed on a contract with the Oakland County Department of Public Workig which gives the green light to the city to start providing wager and sewer facilities to the Woodcroft Subdivision and the newly annexed portions of the city. Under the terms of the agreement, the city will pay a total of \$205,059,43 to the county as its share of the costs of the existing conty water and sewer lines in the array been constructed by the county, but the township was financially responsible for the costs.

Earlier the township had filed a suit against the city seeking to have its financial obligations protected. The agreement approved Monday night by both the city countly and the township board - grew out of the legal mnewarrars.

Snow Removal Ordinance Lacks Enforcement In City

You can be sent to jail up to 90 days in the City of Farmington for not cleaning the snow and ice off the sidewalk.

That's possible under the terms of a city ordinance which classes failure to clean public walks asia misdemeanor.

Enforcement of the ordinance is lax, however, and oftentimes the city is the prime offender.

CITY MANAGER John Dinan says that ordinance is almost impossible to enforce and adds that while the ordinance has been on the books "for years" that he doesn't know of any person ever being fined (up to \$100) or imprisoned for failure to clean the walk.

In today's mechanized society about the only person who is harmed by failure to clean the walks is the mailman. Of course there are a few hardy souls who insist on walking, but most people prefer to drive two blocks for a loaf of bread.

Shoppers in the downtown area often have a hard time sliding between stores during the winter months.

Dinan said that the city is requesting the cooperation of the merchants in keeping the walks clean.

"We would dislike issuing violations of the ordinance," he said, "but the snow cov-ered walks are inconvenient and dangerous in many spots."

UNDER THE TERMS of the ordinance

he snow must be cleaned within 24 hours or the city can issue a violation and take the case to municipal court. It's up to the judge to set the punishment.

If the walks aren't cleared the city has the power, under the ordinance, to clear the walks and bill the owner for the work.

There is no case on record of the city ever having taken this action either.
