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Hopes Dim On Federal Assistance

Farmington Township hopes for federal aid in revitalizing the lower southeast corner of the area dimmed this week after a second visit here by representatives of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Alvin West, of H.U.D.'s regional staff in Chicago, was accompanied by three F.H.A. officials when he visited Farmington after an earlier personal tour of the sector in November.

Although it was agreed that general structural blight would seem to qualify the area for rehabilitation, West told Supervisor Curtis H. Hall that the next move is up to the township.

The stumbling block which this raises (H.U.D.'s requirement that the township adopt a housing code specifying standards applicable to all property in the area).

Hall has referred the matter to the Planning Commission for study.

Pinkert Construction Gets Township Hall Building Job

Pinkert Construction Co. of Birmingham was awarded the contract for construction of the addition to the Farmington Township Hall Monday night by a vote of the trustees.

Total cost of the project was placed at \$379,700 with \$4,200 to be held in abeyance pending the necessity of installing a septic tank and file filed for the facility.

ACTION BY the trustees came after they allowed the low bidder, Pinkert Construction Co. of Detroit, to withdraw its bid after discovering a \$17,000 error in their proposal.

Pinkert submitted the second lowest bid out of a total of 11 received on the project.

The new facility will provide administrative and office space for the township officials. The current township hall will house the police department.
