

## Oakland Offers Class With KMS Firm

Oakland University began classes this week in an engineering course which has attracted national attention, according to John E. Gibson, dean of OU's School of Engineering.

The program in coherent optics by KMS and his associates at KMS Industries represents a service to the academic and industrial research community of the area," Gibson said. "It will permit Oakland University to make available the latest advances in this exploding technology years earlier than would usually be the case."

CALLED "Seminar in Coherent Optics," the course will be presented by a group of top-level scientists and engineers of KMS Industries of Ann Arbor, which is pioneering in a number of scientific fields including optics and electro-optical systems.

## Township Hears About Study Idea

The proposed area study raised its head at Monday night's Farmington Township Board session without the trustees bringing up the subject.

A special meeting of the board has been called for Thursday, Jan. 11, to consider the MSU proposal for a study along with other proposals.

- A communication from the Village of Quakertown enclosing a resolution supporting the study and urging the other governmental units (city, township and Wood Creek) to do the same. This brings to three the total number of governmental units which have officially agreed to the MSU study proposal.
- Three separate, but identical, letters from members of the League of Women Voters chapter urging township adoption of the study idea.
- A letter from City Manager John Dinan reporting on the council's refusal to buy the consolidation election proposal put forth by Trustees Earl Oppenheimer.

NO OFFICIAL comment came from the trustees about the letters. They listened to Hall reading them with the blank expressions that politicians and poker players have perfected and the communications were made a part of the record.

Census Bureau Will Survey Time On Job

Job tenure information is being obtained for the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. The question will be asked in addition to the regular monthly inquiries on employment and unemployment included every month in the bureau's current population survey.

The information will be collected from scientifically selected sample households in the area as well as in 448 other areas throughout the nation.

Farmington School Board trustees bent their policy on school-walkers a trifle Monday night.

Board policy as it stands meant calls for all pupils to walk to school if they live less than one mile distant.

Twelve Alameda first, second and third grade youngsters who walk along 11 Mile Rd. from Ridgewood Rd. were given permission to be bused to school, although they are within the mile distance.

The board bent its policy because the children are young in age and because 11 Mile is dangerous to walk and the road is narrow and has no shoulder.

Alameda pupils who live just across the road are transported.

Permission to ride as given, however, is temporary and will be reviewed at the end of the school year to see if road conditions have improved.
