State Rep. Raymond L. Baker of Farmington, of the 64th House District, will be honored at a recognition dinner March 9 at the Northwood Inn in Berkeley.

Now in his fourth term at Lansing, Rep. Baker is chairman of the House committee on conservation and recreation, as well as a member of the liquor, insurance and youth committees.

Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken and 10th District Congressman Jack H. McDonald will be among the featured speakers. Chairman of the event is Robert Dupree of West Bloomfield Township, Farmington co-chairman are Norm Skellie, Tom McMillan and Mrs. Robert Allaben, from whom tickets are available.

Dems Ask Action On Bad Roads

The Farmington Democratic Club this week joined the rising clamor for a positive road improvement program in the area with the adoption of a resolution calling upon the township to take the lead in determining what the actual needs are.

Citing "continued erosion of our road system" and pointing to "roads that become impassable during rainy seasons," the resolution aimed at township Republican trustees asking for a survey that would determine the repairs needed and the cost involved.

"Once this is done, then the entire community will be in a position to determine a course of action aimed at improving the road situation," the resolution declared.

It continued: "We feel township residents are tired of watching their elected officials claim they can't do a thing about roads as hundreds of cars become mired deeper and deeper into the mud and muck."

"These are the same officials who were able to find nearly \$400,000 to build a new township office structure. Surely they can find some money for road repairs."

A second resolution passed by the club praised the City of Farmington "for setting aside a full week during which property owners could come to City Hall and obtain information on their 1968 assessments."

The club recommended that the township adopt a similar program.

Farmington Pair At Trade Conference

Earl Baumunk and Jerry Allison, of the Farmington area, will be among the 700 instructors and school administrators participating in a Trade and Technical Teachers' Conference to be held at the Michigan State University campus Feb. 23 and 24.

Baumunk is director of vocational education and Allison is trade and industrial coordinator for Farmington schools.

Theme for the conference will be "Improving Teaching for Changing Technologies."

Dr. Victor F. Spaulding, president of Ferris State College, will deliver the keynote address at the opening session.

A REVIEW of the results of the 1963 Vocational Act will be presented by Dr. William P. Pierce, deputy state director of vocational education. He will relate the results to the trade and technical education processes.

Dr. Edgar L. Harden, president of St. Ignace, incorporated, and recently retired president of Northern Michigan University, will speak at the noon luncheon, Friday, on "Commitment to Change."

Friday evening's banquet speaker will be Dr. L. Lament Okey, professor of speech at the University of Michigan.

Co-chairmen of the meetings are Arthur Oetmeier, associate dean of occupational programs at Delta College, and Clovis Ferguson, of Dearborn public schools.

On hand to advise conferees on the latest technological changes will be representatives from business and industry. This information will help educators to determine curriculum changes.

A series of general interest meetings will cover such topics as: Understanding Vocational and Technical Education Programs; Area Vocational Education Programs, Formula for Success; Research in Vocational and Technical Education; Legislative aspects of Vocational Education and Legal Employment of Youth and Veterans' Pension and Readjustment Act of 1967.

Crab Trees Sold At Half-Price

For the 12th year, the Farmington Garden Club is taking orders for Almey Crab Trees. Orders may be placed through March 1 with Mrs. Robert Cassell, 474-6622.

Purpose of the club with this project is "to have a Crab Tree in every yard in Farmington," according to Mrs. Cassell.

The club obtains the trees at the wholesale price of \$3.25 each and sells them for \$3.50, half of what they would cost commercially. The trees for sale are from three to five feet tall and are of hardy, healthy stock. They blossom in early spring, are easy to care for and will reach the height of a house rooftop.

When trees are delivered to Mrs. Cassell's, 4202 Grand River, Farmington, buyers are notified by telephone of their arrival. They are sold on a first come-first sold basis.
