

A. Sansone Killed In Florida

Prominent Redford Township resident and Farmington businessman Anthony J. Sansone was killed Tuesday morning in a Florida auto accident.

His wife, Jean, suffered critical injuries but is reported recovering after surgery at Miami Baptist hospital.

Mrs. Sansone reportedly suffered a broken jaw and internal injuries.

Sansone, 46, was reportedly driving with his wife on a highway near Miami when something apparently went wrong with the steering. His car is reported to have jumped a narrow median and become involved with two other cars.

Reports indicated that only Mrs. Sansone escaped fatal injuries.

The Sansones lived at 14138 Arnold, Redford. Both were prominent in Redford Township civic affairs, especially the Western Heights Civic Association and the Redford Suburban League.

He was the owner and president of Farmington's Trim Zil Company at 28424 Grand River.

The 20-year residence of Redford had embarked Thursday on a three-week golfing vacation to Florida.

A Requiem Mass will be held Friday morning at St. Valentine Catholic Church, 25800 Dow (at Beech). Funeral arrangements are being handled by Hammond-Ilias Funeral Home, 24501 Five Mile.

Survivors include his wife, a daughter, Patty, 16, at home; and a son, Thomas, 16, a freshman at Hillsdale College.

Sansone was the author and producer of several Redford Suburban League charity plays. Mrs. Sansone was the choreographer for Suburban League productions.

Relatives have asked that in lieu of flowers, contributions be made to the Tony Sansone Memorial Fund, Kimloch Branch of Manufacturers' National Bank in Redford, attention Arnold Elin.

City Pays MSU 1st Installment

The Farmington City Council Monday night approved an additional \$100 for its cost in the Michigan State University study of governmental alternatives for the entire area.

This brings the city's share of the \$5,000 cost to \$4,100. Originally the city had allocated \$1,000.

In addition the city voted to pay MSU 20 percent or \$220 immediately. Last week the township refused to vote any funds for the study until after a contract with MSU had been approved by the township board.

The cost of the study is being borne by the city, township, the two villages and the Farmington villages. The township will pay \$2,500, the two villages \$100 each and the Jaycees \$1,200.

The students' works were judged in 10 classifications, including painting and drawing as well as textiles, sculpture, pottery and jewelry.


Scholarships to art schools all over the country are awarded at the national competition. Only seniors may enter the contest.

ment that clearly would prohibit state aid in any form to non-public schools.

BOTH OF THE legislators whose districts include the Farmington area were asked for comment and offered these observations:

Sen. George W. Kuhn called it a "very interesting issue and one in which constitutionality is a question."

"I haven't seen the text of the proposed legislation yet," he stated, "and will proceed cautiously with an open mind while exploring both sides of the issue."

Rep. Raymond L. Baker stated, "I have had perhaps 150 to 170 letters asking assistance for parochial schools, all following about the same format. However, at this point I haven't even seen the proposed bill and will want to give it a lot of study before making a decision."

Asked said that in addition to Catholic sponsorship the drive has the support of Hebrew, Lutheran, Christian Reformed, and Methodist Day Adventist groups in Michigan who finance and operate their own schools.

munication from parish committees and their chairmen to the regional committee, to the diocesan coordinating committee and then to state CEF headquarters.

Asked if he felt the CEF had "shot its wad" with the first huge outpouring of letters to legislators, Abowd said, "The success of this campaign is vital if we are to continue to have a plural school system. People are working on this in every district and there is plenty of material left in reserve to see it through."

To this point, neither the state association of school superintendents nor of school boards has joined the battle, nor has the Michigan Education Association nor State Board of Education. Public schools are asking an increase of \$74 million in state aid over 1967, and the new parochial request, if granted, would push the need for new money almost to \$100 million.
