School Millage Blanked

Oakland County never highlights of the week of interest to residents of the Farmington area include the following developments:

ROYAL OAK -- A proposal for an added five-mill property tax to provide additional operating funds for Royal Oak public schools was defeated by a 6-5 ratio, negative votes running approximately 1,000 more than those favoring the measure.

AYONDALE -- Voters rejected a 12.7-mill tax hike asked by the schools by a 5-1 margin, 2,002 to 396.

TROY -- For the third time in eight months Troy voters turned thumbs down on a school tax increase. This request was for a six-mill boost and it was rejected, 2,208 to 1,319.

BIRMINGHAM -- An open housing ordinance which was adopted by the city commission in November will be subjected to a vote of the people April 1. Although the commission refused to repeal the ordinance, it was suspended when referendum petitions were filed last month.

WEST BLOOMFIELD -- The West Bloomfield Board of Education has refused to renew the contract for the district superintendent, Dr. L.H. Houghton when it expires June 30, Houghton has held the post for the past 16 years.

An official statement said that the action had been taken after "ample time has been taken to weigh all factors."
