Sees Room For Reform In Injury Settlements THE SECOND GREATEST need of injury victims "is pen-sions for the permanently and totally disabled, and for the survivors of falality victims not already covered by Social Security."

Michigan Law School said in a recent speech. Focusing his attention first on the problems of injury victims, Prof. Conard said that 'their greatest need is for medical and rehabilitation treatment without policy limits," similar to that granted through workmen's compensation,

Conard noted that a proposed plan developed by two profes-sors from Harvard and the University of Illinois partially solves this problem in that it assures victims that medical expenses will be paid, up to about \$10,000.

"But this Keeton-O Connell plan," he added, "would not solve the other part of the problem-the fact that every penny of medical benefits is subtractible from the maximum particle.

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The only practical way to supply these pensions, he said, is "a slight extention of the coverage of survivors' and disability insurance under the Social Security system." Coverage of the loss of earn-ings caused by an accident poses another problem, Conard rec-ommended the \$10,000 basic protection coverage included in the Ketedno-O'Connell plan, but noted that even \$10,000 would not supplement wage loss for long, since medical and legal expenses would also have to be subtracted from that sum,

Turning to the problems of the premium payer, Conard said the first need is "to aboilsh the collateral benefits rule" under which the injured might collect duplicate benefits through the "yarious regimes of loss reparations."
