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PUTS BLAME ON STEEL PEN

Englishman Says It Started Handwrit-
ing on the Way Toward Deca-
dence and Neglect

The decay of handwriting was the
subject of a plaint by a correspon-
dent recently in the London Times.
"The steel pen," he wrote, "was
one factor in altering the style and
legibility of writing, and the foun-
tain pen, in some of its varieties, has
proved to be a still more harmful
machine. Typing certainly secures
a legibility, but that is not writing,
and it is doing much to discourage
the practice of calligraphy.

"There is good reason to believe
that neat writing is neither taught
nor even encouraged in our great
secondary schools. Schoolmasters
appear to accept any kind of bad
writing. The average boy or girl
now takes little or no pains to form
letters. In other words, they do not
write at all. Few parents or teachers
appear to take any notice of this
writing, and the letters of the last
century, which were generally neat
and legible, at the hands of both
sexes, certainly put us to shame to-
day."

This "laudator temporis acti" con-
cluded by a curious prediction that
posterity will have some severe com-
ments to make on the handwriting
of the twentieth century, remarks
the Indianapolis News.

ROCKS CRADLE WITH HER TOE

Deceit of Kwakiut Squaw Whereby
Her Hands Are Left Free
for Weaving.

Unique and probably the most
primitive cradle rocking device ever
seen or employed in any part of the
world is the one that has been adopted
by the matter-of-fact squaws of
the Kwakiut tribe of Indians now
living on Vancouver island, British
Columbia.

The mother performs the double
duty of spinning and rocking her in-
fant, snugly packed in a hollowed-
out cradle stuffed with cedar bark
strips, suspended from the limb of
a sapling. This is about the most
realistic and accurate representation
of the old nursery song, "Rock-a-bye,
Baby, in the Tree Top," so far
known.

The most striking part, however,
is that of the Indian mother using
her big toe as the motive power.
With a cord attached to the bent
limb and the other end wound
around her toe, she swings her
laughing offspring to and fro, leav-
ing her hands entirely free for weav-
ing.—Christian Herald.

MUST FACE THE MUSIC

The action of the director of the
Eastbourne Municipal orchestra, who
varied the ordinary methods of the
musical conductor by turning his
back on his men while they were
playing, was the subject of a long
discussion at the meeting of the town
council.

Councillor Eden moved that in fu-
ture the musical director be request-
ed to face his men while conducting
the municipal band. No other con-
ductor in England, he said, faced his
audience, and it was utterly impos-
sible for Mr. Henton to control the
musicians in that way. The band
ought to be conducted in proper
English fashion. Eastbourne spent
nearly \$20,000 on its music, and it
was too big a place to allow of trif-
ling with the band.—London Chron-
icle.

DO WITHOUT KING'S CONSENT

Several Modern Instances Where
Royal Lovers Have Wedded De-
spite Opposition of Monarch.

The rumor which has recently
been going about as to the contem-
plated second marriage of a wid-
owed member of the royal family
has given rise to some comments
which are manifestly absurd.

It has been stated that such an
alliance would be impossible without
the king's consent, but although this
is nominally the case in modern days
there has been wide divergence be-
tween theory and practice, even in
such countries as Russia and Spain,
where the power of the sovereign as
head of his family is, to say the least
of it, as great as that of a British
monarch.

For a whole year the Grand Duke
Cyril of Russia pleaded to be al-
lowed to marry Princess Victoria of
Saxe-Coburg, ex-grand duchess of
Hesse, and when he found the em-
perador on the subject he simply
did without his consent, and the pair
have lived happy ever after.

A year or two later the Infante
Alfonso of Spain fell in love with
another of the handsome Saxe-Cob-
urgs, a younger sister of the Grand
Duchess Cyril, and married her in
the face of the absolute veto of King
Alfonso. In both cases the bride-
grooms were deprived of military
rank and banished, which penalties
have since been remitted.—Fall Mall
Gazette.
