"The steel pen," he wrote, "gas metar in altering the style and legibility of writing, and the fountain pen, in some of its varieties, has proved to be a still more harmful machine. Typing certainly secures a legibility but that is not writing, and it is doing much to discourage the practice of calligraphy.
