Woodruff To Handle Juveniles

Oakland County news developments of recent days of interest to residents of the Farmington area include these items:

PONTIAC--Prosecuting Attorney S. Jerome Bronson has announced appointment of Charles B. Woodruff, a member of his staff for 14 months, to the position of assistant prosecutor in charge of juvenile matters.

PONTIAC -- Douglas H. Hoard, Oakland County director of social services, has resigned effective April 12. He had held the position since March 18, 1967 and in announcing his resignation declared, "I just haven't been able to get any results. Now let someone else try."

WATERFORD--The Waterford school board decided to put a referendum one through four on half-day sessions for a minimum of one semester next year, and also eliminated 93 teaching positions as it sought to reduce its 1968-69 budget \$1.2 million on the heels of losing

a 7 1/2-mill property tax election.

NOVI--Incumbent Councilman Philip Anderson lost out on a re-election bid by one vote in the Village election March 11. Elected to four-year posts

were Raymond H. Evans, an incumbent, and Donald C. Young, Jr., a former councilman. William L. Dwyer, a newcomer to elective office, edged out Anderson for a two-year term.

Road Funds Asked For Townships

Farmington Township Democratic chairman Aldo Vagozzi last week told a legislative committee township need a portion of state highway funds for maintaining local roads.

Vagozzi, chairman of the 19th Congressional District party organization, told the House Roads and Bridges Committee:

"The legislation is badly needed to give townships an opportunity to do something about a deteriorating road situation."

HIS TESTIMONY came in support of a pair of bills that would give townships four per cent of state highway funds. He maintained the funds would strengthen local government by allowing townships to "tackle

the road problems at the local level.

"Most counties merely try to maintain main roads at the expense of local roads. Many local roads are already beyond repair. Others will become so shortly if repairs are not made. A complete rebuilding is much more costly to the taxpayer than timely maintenance."

He spoke against a background of experience in visiting township groups protesting quagmire conditions on local roads.

"THESE ROADS must be repaired," said Vagozzi, "to

take care of a serious health problem created when roads become impassable for ambulances, fire trucks and other emergency vehicles.

"Townships are being urged to go to city status--in many cases before they are ready and able--on the basis that this would allow for a transition period and give these townships a better chance to prepare for cityhood," he testified.

Several Farmington Area Voluntary Road Committee members provided the House Committee photos of Farmington Township roads taken during last spring's thaw.

The State Highway Commission has gone on record as opposing the bill because it would draw funds that would otherwise be available for state roads.
