

Township Police Arrest 4

Farmington township police this week reported the arrest of four persons in two separate breaking and entering cases, plus a fifth who was apprehended on two counts of arson.

Timothy C. Betoske, 18, of 2120 Robinson, and Patrick J. Quinn, 19, of 2125 Birchwood, both were charged with breaking and entering after their arrest while allegedly forcing entry into the O'Green Farm agency.

Both stood mute upon arraignment before Township Justice Byron Walter and in each case bond was set at \$500.

Also facing the same charge were Chester Sulya, 38, of Dearborn Heights, and John Murto, 45, of Detroit, after they were arrested at the residence of Sulya's ex-wife, 22559 Gill Rd.

They, too, were arraigned before Judge Walter and bond was fixed at \$1,000 for each man.

George K. Semerjian, 30, of 30075 Shilwassee, was arrested on the two arson counts involving an automotive camper, according to police. He also stood mute when arraigned before Judge Walter and bond was set at \$500.

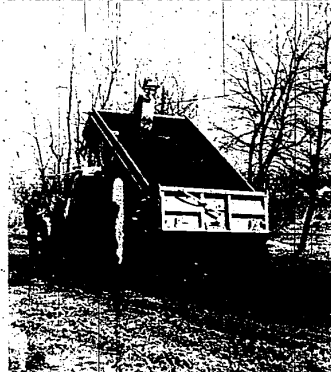

Fined After Reduction In Charge

Fines and probation have been ordered by Farmington Township Justice of the Peace Byron Walter for two defendants who entered guilty pleas to reduced criminal charges this week.

Robert G. Smith, 30, of 83045 Tulane, Farmington, was fined \$100, plus \$15 costs, and placed on two years probation when he pleaded guilty to a disorderly person charge after originally being accused of assaulting and soliciting a minor at the time of his arrest.

John Carl Cross, 17, of 19917 Woodworth, Detroit, who had been arrested on a charge of attempted rape involving a 16-year-old Redford Township girl, pleaded guilty to the reduced charge of assault and battery.

In addition to the same time of \$100, plus \$15 costs, Cross was given one year's probation. He also was ordered to serve two weekends in the Oakland County jail.
