

Alumni Win Recreation Cage Title

Although the Thomas Franke Construction Co. quintet finished on top of the Farmington recreation league basketball standings for the regular 10-game season, play-off honors went to MacDonald's Farmington Alumni.

The Alumni whipped the Farmington Jaycees, 63-43, for top spot in the play-off finals, while the Franke five took a 48-47 squeaker from Arrowsmith Tool & Die in the battle for third place.

Only the top four teams in the final league standings qualified for the play-offs, Republic Underwriters and Johnston & Johnston failing to make it. Over the 10-game route the league saw the Franke quintet in front with a 7-3 record, while the Jaycees were second at 6-4. Both MacDonald's and Arrowsmith had 5-5 records, with Republic finishing 4-6 and Johnston & Johnston 3-7.

Planners Approve 5 Requests

A total of five rezoning requests received the recommendation of the township planners Thursday night in rapid succession.

Approved in a series of five public hearings, which lasted a total of 55 minutes, were:

A combined office and apartment complex on the southwest corner of Middle Belt and Grand River. The F.W. Fordon Co. will build a total of 120 rooms in the apartment development.

Ten lots on Orchard Lake Rd. south of 13 Mile were approved by a business classification. The lots had been zoned for single family homes.

A total of three acres on the west side of Middle Belt just north of Eight Mile Rd. was approved as a site for a nursing and convalescent home.

Five acres in the Independence Green Development were taken from the apartment classification to allow for the construction of a bank and a savings and loan building. The structures will be on the Grand River side of the development.

All of these recommendations must go to the township board for final action. The role of the planning commission is one of making recommendations rather than actual rezoning.

In most cases, however, the township board follows the recommendations of the commission.

Wednesday was a beautiful day for the Farmington Go-See, a tour by chartered bus of city and township led by the League of Women Voters arranged.

The bus left the parking lot at Nardin Park Methodist Church on 11 Mile at 10 a.m. and rolled back in there a little before noon, having toured the 36-square-mile area of the township and through the city.

Thirteen checkpoints were visited on the two-hour trip, including various school sites, urban redevelopment areas, area shopping centers, city park, the proposed community house, Farmington City Center, the township Industrial Park, site of the new library, site of the controversial Middle

Belt-13 Mile rezoning, site of the proposed satellite village and the high point in the township from which you are supposed to be able to see downtown Detroit.
