## FHS Team To Debate Up North

Farmington High School debaters will participate in the fifth annual Mackinac Island Little Festival Debate Tournament June 15 and 16.

Accompanying the team on the trip north will be the Falconaires and the Twelve Tones.

Chairman of the tournament is Lloyd Smith, FHS debate coach. This is the fifth such tournament Smith has arranged and will include teams from Michigan, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

## Birmingham Votes For Open Housing

News developments within neighboring Oakland County communities within the past few days which are of interest to Farmington residents include the following:

**BIRMINGHAM** -- The open housing ordinance which earlier had been passed by the city council and then held in abeyance because of a referendum drive was adopted Monday by Birmingham voters, 4,205 to 3,322. It made Birmingham the nation's second city to adopt

ballots in Monday's millage election showed 1,820 votes in favor of the three-mill tax levy and 1,250 opposed. The added revenue will permit the township to expand its fire and police services as well as originate road improvements.

**PONTIAC** -- Robert L. Kilpatrick, Michigan Bell Telephone Co. manager for southern Oakland County, will serve as county awards chairman for Michigan Week, May 19-25. His committee will judge area nominations for "product of the year."

**BLOOMFIELD HILLS** -- A proposal to increase the operating tax levy for Bloomfield Hills schools by 14 mills, or \$14 per \$1,000 valuation, was moved under at the polls Monday. There were 4,568 votes against the tax boost and only 1,678 in favor.

**NOVI** -- A \$480,000 bond issue to provide added school facilities was approved by Novi voters Monday, 247 to 112.

**ROYAL OAK** -- Carl Ingraham of Birmingham, was re-elected chairman of the Oakland County Commission on Economic Opportunity despite his earlier announcement that he was desirous of relinquishing the position.

**WEST BLOOMFIELD** -- An official count of the township's

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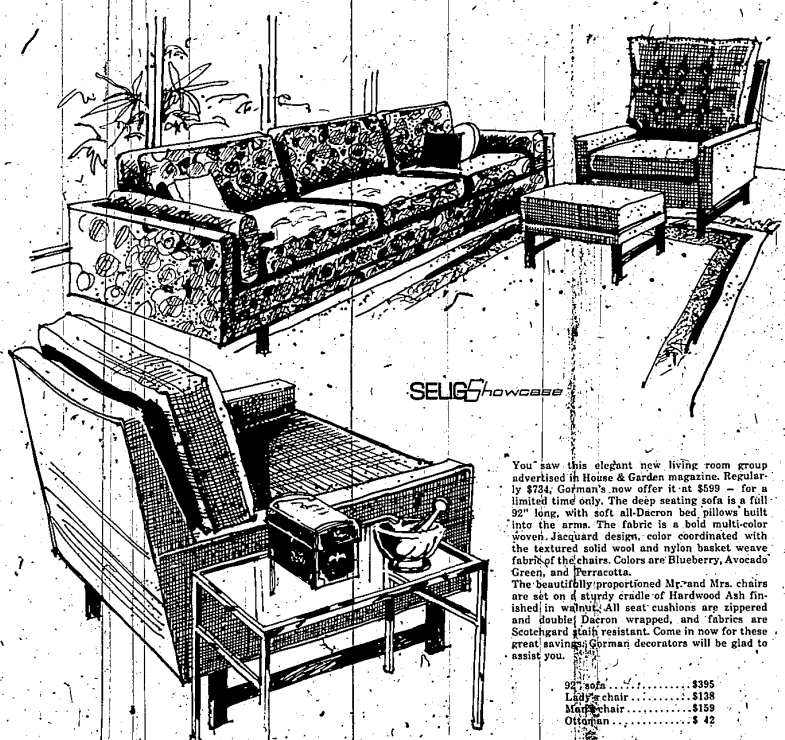
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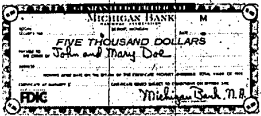
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
