Included in repeat courses are six in business, eight in fine arts, eight in homemaking, seven in language, eight in recreation, three aviation classes, three pertaining to health and safety, two vocational and one, co-sponsored with Michigan State University, on training of athletic coaches.

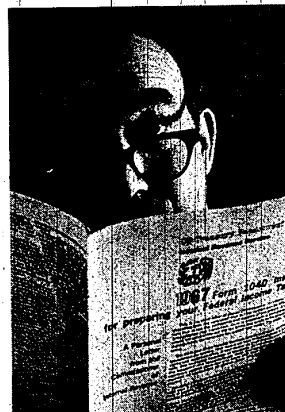
