

Your Mouth May Gossip About You

There is nothing worse than a gossip mouth. Especially if the secrets it tells are your own.

Just that is just what many women have. A give-away mouth that reveals, among other things, imperfect nutritional habits; a lazy beauty routine; and oral cleanliness habits that leave much to be desired.

Acute vitamin B-2 deficiency, according to nutrition expert Adelle Davis, causes the corners of the mouth to split and crack. If the deficiency isn't corrected, these wrinkles that radiate from the mouth soon appear—you know, the ones your lipstick runs into!

Improperly removed makeup resulting from a late night or being "too tired" to do it will also show up as dried, flaky skin that encourages wrinkles. It is the type of carelessness that is almost as unforgivable as neglecting the cleaning and care of your teeth.

Always brush after meals and before going on a date or out for the evening. A sparkling mouth gives you confidence; makes you relax and mix freely on outings.

For the "laugh lines" at the corner of your mouth, massage plenty of cold cream. Beginning at the corner of the mouth, move your fingers upward till they meet at the bridge of your nose. Never use a downward motion. Start at the mouth and repeat as before. Like exercises, regularity is essential for best results.

And smile often. There is no better beauty routine, for a smile relaxes tension and brightens your whole emotional outlook.

School Buses Get Big OK

Cpt. Davis reported to the State Safety Commission that the State Police school bus inspection program is nearly completed and that 50 per cent of buses inspected have been given approval stickers.

He said that "very few" buses were able to pass the first inspection. Buses were found without legally-required equipment. He said many school administrators apparently had trusted manufacturers to deliver completely-equipped vehicles and had not checked newly purchased buses.

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U-M Approves Conversion Of Girls Dorms For Men

ANN ARBOR—Conversion of several all-girl residence units for occupancy by men students at The University of Michigan has been authorized by the Regents.

The changes will be made in time for the opening of the fall term next August. The Regents also authorized turning over part of a men's residence hall to five academic departments for office space.

Alice Lloyd Hall will be converted from an all-girl unit to a coeducational residence hall. Before changes are made at Mosher-Jordan Hall, there will be further consultation with present residents there.

ASSIGNMENT OF MEN to certain units in the Oxford Housing Project is a possibility, although the final decision will depend on several factors, including the need to accommodate returning women and the availability of sufficient space for men in the other converted units.

Lloyd and Winchell houses in West Quadrangle will be temporarily converted into academic offices for at least two years.

"Changes of this proportion and implication are not undertaken lightly," said Richard L. Cutler, vice president for student affairs, in recommending the action. "Yet full realization of the existence of surplus student housing and the shortage of faculty office space offer no realistic alternative."

Projections for next fall indicated a surplus of some 600 spaced residence halls. However, the surplus was in women's housing, with the expectation of about 300 too many women's spaces and 300 too few men's spaces. The University has room for about 9,500 students in the residence halls; about 8,900 are expected to occupy them next fall.

THE SURPLUS will be reduced by about 225 spaces when the two West Quad houses are turned over to the departments of history, political science, and German, Romance, and Slavic languages. Those five departments are among the most crowded in existing quarters.

In Alice Lloyd Hall, 304 spaces will be converted for use by men at an estimated cost of \$20,000. The proposed changes at Mosher-Jordan Hall would involve converting 243 spaces in the Mosher hall at an estimated cost of \$100,000. Remodeling in West Quad for offices will cost an estimated \$60,000.

The changes will be financed from building and equipment reserves, accumulated net revenue on debt-free halls, and general building and equipment replacement funds.

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
