

## Library Adds Books On Religion To Shelf

Farmington District Library has acquired approximately 100 books of the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths. The books were purchased from the "Memorial Fund" left by a recently deceased Farmington Township resident.

The books are of interest to children and adults, as well as clergymen. They include reference works, guides to the Bible, books on missionaries and other miscellaneous subjects.

Reference book selections include Unger's Bible Dictionary.

Dictionary of the Bible by John McKenna, Young's "Analytical Concordance to the Bible" and The Wycliffe Bible Commentary.

There are 10 volumes on the Romans by Dr. D.G. Barnhouse and 17 books of Erdman's from The Gospel of St. Matthew through The Revelation of John. Also available are several guides to the Bible including The New Testament in 28 translations, "Know Your Bible," "The English Bible" and "The Independent Bible Study."

For children there are such books as the Children's Bible and Devotions for the Children's Hour.

Many of the books relate to missionaries, their work, experiences, problems and results. Some are about the Christian martyrs, while others are about the life and times of Jesus.

There are two books relating to Christian marriage and two on the life of Billy Graham.

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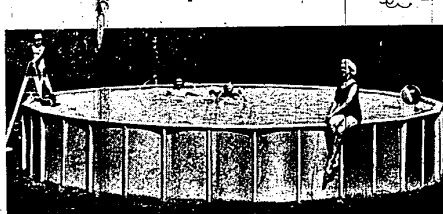
