

# Summer Hope To Make Consumer Survey

Prices—Higher in suburbia or the inner city?  
Service—Better or worse depending on the color of skin?  
A consumer survey, aimed at answering these questions, will begin in late April in the Detroit metropolitan area.  
The survey is sponsored by Focus: Summer Hope, a social action program dealing with racism under the leadership of Catholic clergy and laity in the Detroit archdiocese.  
FR. WILLIAM CUNNINGHAM, a leader of Summer Hope and professor at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit, said 500 women will take part in the four-week survey beginning Friday, April 26.  
"The women will be drawn from those who have already been involved in Summer Hope programs," said Fr. Cunningham, "but we invite other women who are interested and committed to join us in this survey."  
"This will be a massive educational program which will educate the consumer, and we hope, will lead to cooperation between the merchant and buyer at the local level."  
"Through this cooperation, both will benefit. The buyer will be assured of fair prices and good service and the merchant will enjoy increased volume."  
THE WOMEN volunteers, who will work singly and in teams, will be drawn from the inner and outer city and the suburbs. They will blanket the metropolitan Detroit area, visiting supermarkets, pharmacies and retail stores.  
Under study will be prices, facilities, quality of goods, personnel, and differences in service according to area and skin color of the shopper.  
To corroborate the judgment of shoppers, professional evaluators will check out within the hour, perishable items brought to central distribution points.  
THE SHOPPER will first un-

dergo an intensive training program directed by Mrs. Roberta McBride, consumer education coordinator at Wayne State University.  
Aiding in the training will be staff members of the Mayor's Committee on Human Resources Development, the Detroit-based poverty program. Underwriting the entire project is the Detroit archdiocese.

## New Auxiliary Archbishop Is Great On Hockey Ice

When the Most Rev. Thomas J. Gumbleton is consecrated an auxiliary bishop to Archbishop John F. Deardorff of Detroit on May 1, he will be America's youngest Catholic bishop, at 38, and probably the only bishop regularly playing a slashing game of hockey.  
With four major Church assignments, each of which ordinarily keeps an administrator busy full time, his physical activity could consist chiefly of switching from one of his desks to another if he did not have the hockey outlet.  
His friends say it is characteristic that, in search of exercise, he found a way to cram a maximum amount into a minimum of time.  
When appointed bishop he was Vice Chancellor, a key executive post in executing the needs of 1,500,000 Catholics in the Archdiocese. He found time besides to oversee a "brainstorming" survey to uncover pioneer ideas for renewal and a similar program for lay people, meanwhile supervising a training program for new pastors.  
Additionally, he was acting director of the many-branched Community Affairs Department of the Archdiocese.  
Among his concerns were the Urban Parish Apostolate (trying to re-define the role of the parish in the inner city), and human relations programs such as Project Equality (affirma-

live action for equal employment, Housing and Urban Development with special emphasis on finding ways to provide quality housing at low cost), and the Archdiocesan Poverty Program (in which he acted as Archdiocesan liaison with the Michigan Catholic Conference in getting the program underway).  
His third major assignment was performing a pastor's duty and capitalizing on some experiments in parish organization that are going on in the Archdiocese as administrator pro tem of Holy Ghost Church 18400 Bolder, a semi-suburban parish with a congregation largely made up of middle-class Negroes.  
His fourth major activity was as chairman of the Archdiocesan Building Commission, which oversees the multitude of programs of institutional construction.  
Those who attended the pastor-training program he helped to put together were surprised at the depth of his understanding of parish life with problems, because on the record he appears to have little more than four years of parish work.  
This came about, Alphonse Parish in Dearborn, Mich., being his 1958 ordination and his 1960 appointment as Assistant Chancellor.  
What was not widely known was that in connection with studies abroad he participated in parish work fairly extensively in England and Italy. He also made contact—meeting and working with priests and people—with parishes in Germany, Hungary and Poland. Finally he was even exposed to parish activities in Russia. He used to preach and hear confessions in Italian.  
The sharpness of body checks has in no way diminished since the announcement of Mgr. Gumbleton's elevation to bishop. He is philosophical about it, saying, "It was warned that the position of bishop was not as easy to fill as it might seem to be, but I didn't expect to get evidence of it quite so early."

## St. Innocent To Mark Resurrection On April 21

The feast of Christ's Resurrection—known as Pascha in the Orthodox church—will be celebrated Sunday, April 21, in the Church of St. Innocent.  
St. Innocent, located at 23300 West Chicago, Redford Township, is the first American Orthodox Catholic church in the metropolitan Detroit area.  
Its members have been preparing for Pascha with further work on the interior of the church, completed last year, and have completed the addition of new pews.  
SPECIAL PASSION and Bright Week services will begin on Holy Thursday April 18, with liturgy at 9 a.m. and a Vigil Service at 7:30 p.m. A Vigil Burial service will be held at 7:30 p.m. Holy Friday, April 19, and on Holy Saturday there will be liturgy at 9:30 a.m. and a midnight service at 11:30 p.m.  
Liturgy at 10:30 a.m. on Pascha, April 21, and at 8:30 a.m. on Paschal Monday, April 22, will complete the week.  
THE TERM PASCHA is Hebrew for passing over and deliverance, and the first one was celebrated in the Old Testament church in memory of the angel sent to destroy all first-born Egyptian children and pass over the homes of the Hebrews.  
To the Orthodox church, Pascha also means the passing over with Christ by His suffering, death and resurrection.  
The Orthodox commentary defines Pascha as a "transfer." It is the day on which God created the world from nothing, the day when God transported the Israelites across the Red Sea to save them from the Egyptians, and the way in which he took a human form in order to rescue man from elevated and led him into Heaven to his ancient state of incorruption.  
St. Innocent holds regular weekly services with catechism at 9 a.m. Sundays, liturgy at 10 a.m., and a coffee hour immediately afterwards.
