Be Careful When You Launder Glass Fiber

Proper laundering of glass fiber articles helps maintain durability and appearance and prevents damage to the glass fibers. Dorothy Goss, University of Illinois Extension home management specialist, suggests these laundering instructions: Hand wash rather than machine wash. Launder glass fabrics separately, using a mild soap or synthetic detergent. Handle fabrics carefully. Avoid rubbing or twisting articles. Rinse fabrics thoroughly. Roll or wipe articles with a towel. Then spread them out flat or hang on padded lines to dry. Do not use a clothes dryer. Do not iron glass fabrics. Do not dry-clean.

GLASS FIBERS are used in household fabrics and home furnishings because of their drapability, durability, appearance and fire resistance, Miss Goss explains. Laundering care can preserve these qualities as well as the life of the article. When washing glass fiber articles, avoid rubbing, recommends Miss Goss. Agitation — such as that of a washing machine — may cause bending and abrasion, and small pieces of the glass fiber may break off. Occasionally an item will completely break into small pieces. IF GLASS FIBER articles are laundered with other pieces of the family laundry, the broken particles may become embedded in the other clothing or linens. Clothing contaminated with particles of glass can cause itching and a rash.

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
