# Fuel Is Source Of Boat Fires

For a happy summer season of "Sailing, sailing, over the bounding main," always keep fire safety precautions well in mind, urges the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

The international fire safety organization offers these vital pointers for week-end sailors:

1. During fueling operations, enforce a strict "No Smoking" rule--be sure all open flames have been extinguished--keep fuel away from ignition sources--immediately wipe up any fuel spilled on the engine and elsewhere.
2. Portable fuel tanks used with outboard motors should be removed from the boat for filling. If extra fuel is carried aboard, use only approved safety containers or portable tanks. Never store reserve fuel supplies in the engine or living compartments.
3. Before starting an inboard motor, ventilate the engine compartment and make sure there is no smell indicating presence of gasoline vapors.
4. Be a good "boatiekeeper." Keep bilge clean of oil and gasoline. Wipe up any spills--especially oily ones--or ragged to accumulate. Store matches well out of the reach of children.
5. Stoves should be only those approved for marine use. Never use a portable LP-Gas-fired stove or one fueled by gasoline.
6. Don't use portable heaters of any type on the boat.
7. For fire protection purposes, every motorboat should have at least one approved fire extinguisher, of the type designated for use on Class B--flammable liquid--fires. The larger the craft, the more extinguishers it should have. Keep extinguishers near the equipment or just outside the compartments they are to protect. Be sure they are kept well charged and otherwise in first-rate working condition at all times.

# Scientists Keep Producing New Kinds Of Fish

As if fishermen didn't have enough trouble with names for their quarry, the "walleye" is known by 80 common names, including "pickereel" and "yellow perch," and scientists keep on creating brand-new fish.

According to Dr. Karl F. Lagler, professor of fisheries and zoology at The University of Michigan, scientists do not have this trouble with common names of fish. For them, fish, like all other animals and plants, have only one scientific name in Latin.

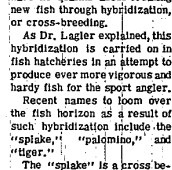
Perhaps this is why scientists have no qualms about creating new fish through hybridization, or cross-breeding.

As Dr. Lagler explained, this hybridization is carried on in fish hatcheries in an attempt to produce ever more vigorous and hardy fish for the sport angler.

Recent names to loom over the fish horizon as a result of such hybridization include the "spike," "palomino," and "tiger."

The "spike" is a cross between the speckled (or brook) trout and the lake trout which has been victimized by the sea lamprey in the Great Lakes. The spike is being stocked extensively in Lake Huron by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

The "palomino" is Pennsylvania's recent cross of the rainbow and the golden trout. The "tiger" is the result of hybridization of the pike and muskellunge in Wisconsin.

# Westland's Dr. Hornbeck Named Cancer Chairman

The appointment of Dr. Robert J. Hornbeck, 8452 Rickles Drive, Westland, as Crusade Chairman for the Western Wayne Unit of the Michigan Cancer Foundation was announced by Dr. Michael J. Brennan, Vice President in charge of scientific research for the Ford Motor Company and General Crusade Chairman for the Foundation.

Dr. Hornbeck, owner of X-ray Clinics in Plymouth, Livonia and Farmington and a nuclear medicine clinic in Livonia, received the 1967 Man of the Year Award from Visitation High School for his outstanding activities in the Youth's Athletic Program and last year was elected by the City of Livonia for chairmanship of a committee which succeeded in getting the voters' approval of an \$11,500,000 bond issue for capital improvements.

Active in church and civic affairs, Dr. Hornbeck is married and the father of a married son, Norris, of Atlanta, Michigan, and a 14-year-old daughter, Christina.

AS CRUSADE CHAIRMAN for this area, Dr. Hornbeck will be assisted by Mrs. Mae Hudson of Dearborn, chairman of the women's crusade committee. Together they will coordinate a program of theater showings designed especially for women.

Scheduled for local theaters, the program will consist of two films produced by the Michigan Cancer Foundation: "A Breath of Fresh Air" dramatizing the importance of early detection in the cure of breast cancer and "A Habit for Life", a film showing the necessity for early detection of uterine cancer.

The crusade slogan adopted by the Foundation this year is "Sometimes a person wonders," punctuated by an interbearing.

"We feel that many persons wonder about cancer," Mrs. Hudson said. "And I think most women wonder about their susceptibility to such sites as breast and uterus. Ironically, both of these sites of cancer are curable if they are detected before any visible signs appear, and yet they are responsible for most cancer deaths among women."

"We can't appeal too strongly to the women of this community to spend an afternoon with us at the theater closest to their homes. Not only are the films informative, but there will be a medical doctor who will give a brief talk on cancer control and answer any questions motivated by the film showings."
