

Senate OKs Kuhn Bill On Security

The State Senate has given 27 to 9 approval of Sen. George Kuhn's bill to set up a State Internal Security Council.

It passed by the House and signed by the governor, the bill would set up a nine-man group to meet monthly. "To keep abreast of all subversive activity, either planned or contemplated, which would tend to undermine the health, welfare, and public safety," said Kuhn. The West Bloomfield lawmaker, whose district includes Farmington, Livonia and Plymouth, said:

"We learned from last summer's riots the necessity for the utmost coordination and planning by all law enforcement agencies to effectively combat any future unrest."

"The last crisis proved to be a 'comedy of errors'...The protection and security of public utilities, such as electrical plants, communications, water, gas, etc., are also of prime concern."

Members of the Internal Security Council would include the governor, state police commissioner, National Guard commander, state attorney general, two senators and two representatives.

Panfishing Picks Up In Area

Panfishing is beginning to pick up in southeastern Michigan as the weather warms, according to reports from the State Conservation Department district office in Pontiac.

A few—but good-size—bluegills are being taken at Oxbow, Pontiac, Alderman, Big and Union lakes in Oakland County. Medium perch were taken on the Huron River at Flat Rock. The Huron and Clinton rivers are getting heavy pressure for rough fish.

Fish season hasn't started yet, and the regular trout season begins April 27.

The Conservation Department warns that woods are dry and forest fire hazards great. Outdoorsmen should check with the department before starting open fires, and should also take precautions to prevent grass and forest fires.

E. Indian To Speak On Non-Violence

Dr. Vyas Thirtha, of Hyderabad, India, will address the Livonia Citizens for Better Human Relations at a meeting at 8:30 p.m. Sunday, April 21, in St. Timothy United Presbyterian Church, 16700 Newburgh. His topic will be "Non-Violence: Faith in a Course of Action."

Dr. Thirtha is a professor of educational sociology at Osmania University in Hyderabad and received his doctorate at Stanford University. Currently he is a consultant on India and Southeast Asia for the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

The meeting also will feature a brief memorial to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by student members of the group, and a discussion of the Focus: Summer Hope program in three Livonia Catholic parishes.

Rams Coach To Address Alma Banquet

Professional football's 1967 coach of the year, George Allen of the Los Angeles Rams, will be the speaker at Alma College's third annual All Sports Reunion to be held Thursday, April 25, in Lansing.

Allen, a right end on the 1943 Alma football team, is the third prominent gridiron figure formerly associated with the college to headline the annual get-together of former Scot athletes.

At the first reunion in 1966 Bob Dooney, head football coach at the University of Nebraska and a star Alma gridironer in the 1960s, was the speaker. Last year Lloyd Eaton, head coach at the University of Wyoming and a former Alma coach, was the principal speaker and Jim Northrup, Detroit Tiger outfielder who was an all-MIAA quarterback as well as a baseball standout at Alma, was the master of ceremonies.

This year's reunion, which will be held at the Lansing Elks Club, is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m., with the showing of motion picture highlights of Alma College's 1967 undefeated football season.

Regional Parks Set Records

Two of three regional recreational sites of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority reported record-breaking attendance for the month of March, while the third was a near-record.

Setting record breaking attendance was Metropolitan Beach near Mt. Clemens, with 72,800 visitors in March, compared to over 62,000 persons for the month of March in 1967. A record high was also es-

tablished at Stony Creek Metropolitan Park north of Utica where 47,000 persons visited during March, which was more than double the 22,000 visitors during March of 1967.

Kensington Metropolitan Park, near Milford had 59,500 visitors during the month of March, which was just 100 persons less than the record high of over 59,600 persons set in 1966.

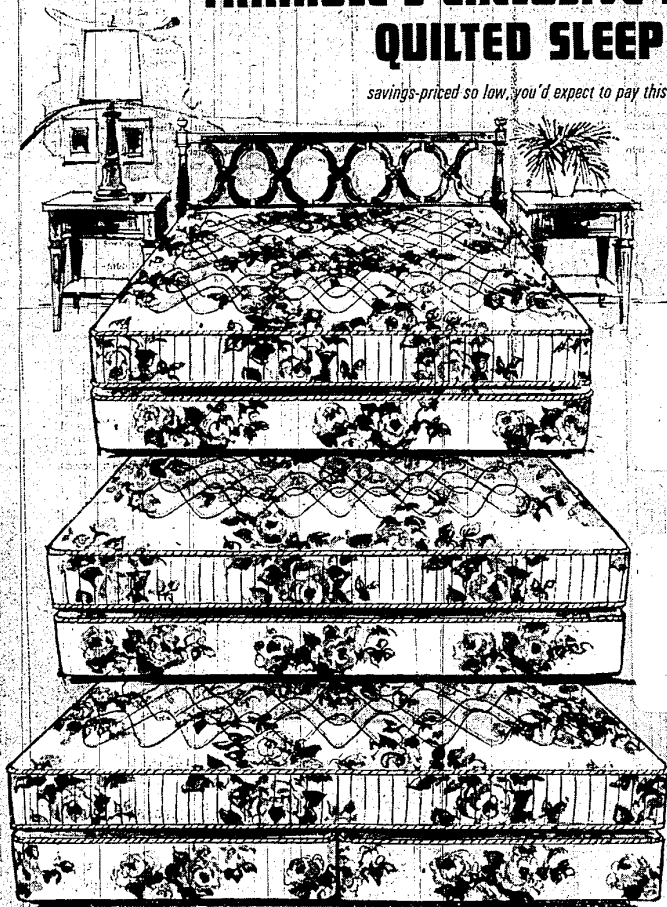
