#### Redford

Henry Steffen opened his new meat market as promised last Saturday and reports a good trade already. His shop is well stocked and as he has a good experienced cutter there is no reason why he should not secure his share of the trade.

Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stang, who had previously purchased lots 33 and 34 on Forest avenue on Oak Grove were out from the city again the first of the week and closed a contract with C. E. Ramsey for lot 32. They have contracted with Jos. Dallavo for a small building to be placed on the rear of one of the lots to be eventually used for a garage, but they will move into it in a few months until they can get a dwelling ready.

Constant practice by the members of the minstrel company should assure the public a good entertainment. We understand there are some real artists in the bunch.

The meeting held last Friday to ascertain the wishes of the taxpayers of the district regarding the size and kind of school building that should be erected was quite largely attended, there being between 75 and 100 representative taxpayers present.

The committee having the meeting in charge, had secured the attendance of Mr. Malcomson of the firm of Malcomson & Higginbotham, Detroit architects, who make a specialty of school buildings.

After a full and free discussion, in which many questions were asked and answered by the architect, a motion was made that the committee go ahead with their plans as outlined, and the motion was carried unanimously, not a dissenting vote being heard.

While Redford lacks even the semblance of fire protection it has

the "makings" of an efficient fire department. About noon last Monday fire destroyed a building used by the Redford Lumber company as a barn and warehouse, and although it was connected to other building with lumber piles all around, the flames were confined to the building in question.

Two hundred and fifty doors with a lot of oak flooring and finishing lumber was destroyed, but the loss, while considerable, was slight compared to what it would have been if the wind had been in the opposite direction, or if the crowd of willing workers had not shown such good fire fighting qualities.

The origin of the fire is unknown but it was discovered by a man who was passing as it burst forth in the upper part of the building.

Redford's only hardware firm has undergone another change. Only last September the firm name was changed from C. C. Burgess & Son, when Geo. Burgess retired, to Burgess & Emmons. Now Roy Burgess has sold his interest to Walter V. T. Swazey, who unites with Mr. Emmons, who had previously purchased the interest of Geo. C. Burgess.

Both gentlemen composing the new firm are hardware men of long experience. Both have been connected with the wholesale business and both have had experience as commercial travellers. They have, in addition, served in the retail trade. It would be hard to find two men better equipped to handle a hardware business than these two.

With ample capital at their command, and a record for each of integrity, the Record bespeaks for the new concern a business that will keep pace with the great growth of this community.

Mr. Swazey and his estimable wife will soon be residents of this village, and the writer of this having lived next door neighbor to them for several years, is very glad to welcome them in the same capacity again.

R. H. Burgess will devote his

time during the coming summer to selling the Ford automobiles, having retained the agency for this territory.

The Farmers' Institute did not draw out as large a number of farmers as it probably should. The crowd was a fair-sized one, but the farmers did not predominate. There was a good attendance of townspeople, a large sprinkling of ladies and children, but not as many farmers as a farmers' institute is supposed to draw out.

We don't know the reason for this lack of attendance on the part of the agriculturists, whether it is on account of no interest in such affairs as a rule, or whether these institutes do not fill the bill.

Our farmers certainly are not lacking in a desire for knowledge of up-to-date and scientific methods of conducting their business and it seems that if the institutes are as helpful as they are intended to be that the farmers would be on hand in large numbers.

Village election is nearly due and it is time to begin to study the matter a little. Four trustees are to be elected this spring in the place of Messrs. Bosworth, Lahser and Vrooman, whose terms expire, and DeNio whose place is vacant on account of removal. Northrop and Lamphere are the only hold-overs.

In addition there is the president, clerk, treasurer and assessor who are elected every year.

This paper has no candidates to propose and only hopes that men will be selected who are competent to cope with the questions that are coming, and that are now here, in regard to the improvements that are so imperatively needed.

There will be some questions to solve in the ensuing year, that will need the attention of good men and it is up to the voters to see that only those who are capable and sufficiently interested in the welfare of the town to devote enough of their time and talents to the duties of their office to accomplish whatever is needed.
