IOC Board Votes Against S. Africa In Olympics

It appears now that South Africa may not be permitted to compete in the 1968 Olympic Games at Mexico City.

The nine-man executive committee of the Games has voted against South Africa and it's now up to all countries to vote on a vote which is expected to support the committee.

When South Africa was readmitted recently and told it could send an entry as long as it was an inter-racial team, nation after nation promptly announced it would not go to the Games.

More than 40 countries had taken the action. Most now are expected to announce they'll be back in the Games, scheduled for mid-October.

Wolverine Daily Double Pays Record High \$1045

Although satisfied with the turnout for his two experimental matinee-night programs on Wednesday and Saturday, Wolverine Raceway officials realize there is quite a job ahead in selling afternoon racing in the Detroit area.

Permission for the unprecedented day-night double bills was granted by Racing Commissioner Leo Shimmy after Wolverine lost four nights of racing due to the curfew in the Detroit area imposed after demonstrations in the wake of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The Wednesday night program attracted 2,315 paid customers with 4,595 turning out for the evening half for a total of 6,910 for the doubleheader.

The weather conditions were anything but favorable Saturday with a dull, overcast afternoon that found a drizzling rain adding woe to the early races. Even then a crowd of 3,541 was in the stands and 8,665 went through the turnstiles in the evening.

NEITHER WAS a record but the crowd had hardly settled into seats Saturday night before Wolverine's 12-year-old record for a daily double payoff went by the boards.

It came about when Roger L., a five-year-old who was overlooked by bettors even though showing four wins in 18 previous starts, turned in a wire-to-wire victory in the opener and paid \$34.80.

That was just a sample of what was in store in the second race when Ridge Valley Duke, a six-year-old who had shown nothing in six outings, came storming down the middle of the track in the stretch drive and hit the wire with a length and a half margin at better than 38-1 odds.

The crowd roared when the mutual board flashed the prices of \$78, \$17.40 and \$6.30 across the board. It roared even louder when the daily double payoff was announced as \$1,045.20—the highest in Wolverine history and believed to be the most ever paid on a daily double at a Michigan harness track.

It bettered the previous mark of \$865.80 set in 1956.

PHILIP BRIAN, a seven-year-old speedster from the Mipal Stable of Westland, who has been stopping in the stretch after setting blazing paces in the weekly Open Pace, didn't stop Saturday. With Jim Merriman in the sulky, Philip Brian took the lead on the first turn and stayed in front all the way, winning by a length in 2:04.3, fastest mile of the meeting.
