

School Bonds OK'd For Sale

Formal application to sell \$8 million worth of construction bonds was approved by the Farmington School Board during its regular session April 25.

The bond issue was approved by the Farmington voters in 1966 for the construction of pools and auditoriums at both Farmington and North Farmington High School and are scheduled to be included in the third high school, Harrison High.

Construction work on the pools and auditoriums has begun at Farmington and North Farmington. Completion date is expected in Jan., 1969.

This work has been paid for from the proceeds of a \$6 million bond issue approved in 1965. When the 1969 bonds are sold the \$6 million fund will be repaid.

With the setting of the wheels in motion, the school district still has reserve of \$9 million in bonds approved last fall that remain to be sold.

Out of this approximately \$7 million in bonds will (out of the \$3 million issue and part of the \$9 million authorization) go toward the construction of the new Harrison High School and the next elementary school to be constructed.

Plans are currently being drawn up for the elementary school which will be located on the north side of the I-696 expressway just west of Interstate Rd.

IN OTHER ACTION the Board:

Approved the purchase of \$20,213 of equipment for the vocational education addition to Farmington Senior High School and the purchase of \$945 of equipment for the proposed Resource Center at the William Grace School.
