

Who's World's Champ? Ellis Wins WBA Version

Take your pick as to who's the world's heavyweight boxing champion.

A few weeks ago Joe Frazier won the version of the crown recognized by New York, Massachusetts and a couple other states when he beat Michigan's Buster Mathis.



Last Saturday night it was Jimmy Ellis over Jerry Quarry in a split decision at Oakland in the World Boxing Association's heavyweight title battle.

One judge called the fight even, another ruled it decisively in favor of Ellis while the referee saw it for Ellis by just one point.

Ellis started strongly and finished the same way.

Just in case one doesn't like either Frazier or Ellis, who likely will oppose one of these days, there's always Cassius Clay, who in the opinions of many still is the champ, although the authorities of the ring say "not" because of his refusal to answer a U.S. Army draft call.

A SURPRISE marked the first weekend's play in the Big Ten baseball race. Underdog Michigan stunned highly-favored Michigan State twice, 4-2, and 4-1. As a result the Wolverines lead the race.
