

Rights Laws Touch Off British Demonstrations

LONDON—Twenty non-white immigrant organizations moved Monday to organize a million United Kingdom non-whites in a combat "Racialism Alliance." One of their spokesmen warned that the racial climate could breed a made-in-Britain hot summer. The immigrant groups drew up their plans for a Black People's Alliance at a Sunday meeting. As they talked, 1,500 demonstrators marched on 10 Downing St. to urge Prime Minister Harold Wilson to not against racialism.

PARIS — Clovis Roblain, a 66-year-old retired truck driver who received the heart of a young traffic accident victim in Europe's first heart transplant, died of complications Monday. The operation was performed over the weekend and doctors at the time had expressed misgivings about Roblain's recovery. Early Monday doctors announced that the patient was suffering from cerebral damage. Thirty hours after the operation the doctors also reported to newsmen that the patient had suffered a circulation failure during surgery and since then nerve complications had set in.

HAMILTON, Bermuda—Two nights of rioting, looting and arson brought a proclamation of a state of emergency, including a 9:30 p.m. to dawn curfew, in Bermuda. Debris littered many of the city's streets, where at least 300 youths, mostly Negro, ran wild over the weekend, set

millie alleging that Ky took advantage of a CIA-backed sabotage operation to smuggle opium from Laos to Saigon. The report accused Ky of using U.S. planes for smuggling while he commanded Vietnamese pilots in 1963-64.

BONN, Germany—West Germany's extreme right-wing National Democratic party made its most impressive display of strength Sunday as it won 9.8 per cent of the total vote in the state election in Baden-Wuerttemberg. The NPD, described as a neo-Nazi party by its critics, has now posted electoral successes in all seven state elections it has contested since the party was formed in 1965.

TOKYO—About 400 Japanese left-wing students kept police at bay for more than an hour Sunday on Tokyo's Ginza. The rock-throwing students chanted "return Okinawa" and anti-Vietnam war slogans. The trouble broke out when 5,000 demonstrators held a rally in downtown Tokyo and marched past

government buildings demanding the immediate return of Okinawa to Japan by the United States.

PRAGUE -- Lt. Col. Josef Pospiscky, head of the Prague Police Investigation department, committed suicide while under medical treatment, the Interior Ministry announced Monday. The brief announcement said Pospiscky was found hanged in the woods.

BONN Germany—The United States, Britain and France have called on the Soviet Union to quickly restore freedom of access to Berlin. Several West German officials have been barred from driving through East Germany to reach West Berlin.

Gary Fillmore Is Promoted To Captain

Gary L. Fillmore, son of Mrs. Nellie M. Fillmore, 195 S. Union, Plymouth, has been promoted to Army captain while serving as commanding officer with the Kaiserslautern Equipment Maintenance Center, Kaiserslautern, Germany.

Capt. Fillmore entered the Army in February 1966 and arrived overseas in July of that year.

The 24-year-old officer was graduated from Plymouth High School in 1961 and received a B.B.A. degree in 1965 from Eastern Michigan University, where he obtained his commission through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps program.

Capt. Fillmore is a member of the Theta Chi fraternity and the Scabbard and Blade Society.

SAIGON—Thousands of helicopter-borne U.S. and South Vietnamese troops have invaded the A Shau Valley in a massive allied operation to smash an enemy threat to Hue and other population centers along South Vietnam's Northern coast. The helicopters encountered heavy anti-aircraft fire as they entered the valley.

LONDON—The Beatles have turned down an invitation to sing for Queen Elizabeth II at charity variety show. The group said it was doing only recording and film work, and was not performing for any live shows.

LONDON—British political leaders pleaded for calm in the nation last weekend after passage of civil rights legislation touched off several demonstrations. More than 1,400 demonstrators walked off their jobs in support of Enoch Powell, a Conservative member of Parliament whose "Keep Britain White" speech sparked an outburst of racial emotion. Powell


