

Poppy Day Is Coming On May 23

Poppy Day is Thursday, May 23. Mayor Harvey W. Moelke, in sleep with mayors throughout these United States, asks the public to buy poppies, and help a worthy cause.

The money goes toward the support of disabled and needy veterans of wars, and widows and children of deceased veterans.

"The basic purpose of the annual sale by the Allied Veterans Committees of Livonia is eloquently reflected in the desire to honor the dead by helping the living," the mayor said in proclaiming the day. Buddy Poppies are sold by the Veterans of the Foreign Wars, American Legion Poppies by the American Legion, and Poppies by the Disabled American War Veterans.

The little bow, which now serves to mark the back of men's hats, is a relic of the past: when hats were made in only a few sizes. Drawstrings were put in the lining to make the hat fit the head.

ALSO SEEKING to represent the employees as exclusive representative for the various classifications involved were Local 118 and Metropolitan Council 23, AFSCME, AFL-CIO.

Voters were permitted to vote

for either, or neither.

But when the day was done, the State Labor Board officials who had supervised the election locked the boxes, and the records, impounding them pending a hearing.

Robert Pisarski, chief trial examiner for the Labor Board, said a date agreeable to all parties is being set, and that a hearing will be held in May by Joseph Bixler, a trial examiner sitting as judge.

The hearing will be open, and the Teamster's charges will be aired. Bixler will determine whether the charges, whatever they are, are true or correct. The hearing will be at the board offices at 1400 Cadillac Square Building, in Detroit.

Those who voted in the election included custodians, bus drivers, cafeteria workers, maintenance employees, warehouse employees, deliverymen, and garage employees. Not eligible were office clerical, supervisors and substitutes, teachers and administrative officials.

SCHOOL OFFICIALS said they were at a loss to know the basis for the complaints of the Teamsters, who had been trying for two years to get a bargaining agency election.

The school board set aside space for the booths in the warehouse, and the state supervised the election. Teachers, secretaries and some other employees have their

own organizations, which bargain for salaries, benefits, and other gain with the administration working conditions.
