Awards

Fifty-one Observerland students are among 1,000 Michigan high school seniors awarded Regents-Alumni scholarships by the University of Michigan. The winners were selected by the Committee on University scholarships from about 2,900 applicants representing some 500 state high schools. Stipends vary according to the financial need of the winners, and range from honorary \$50 entrance awards to \$770 a year grants. Awards continue for the normal length of the student's degree program--if his academic record justifies renewal.

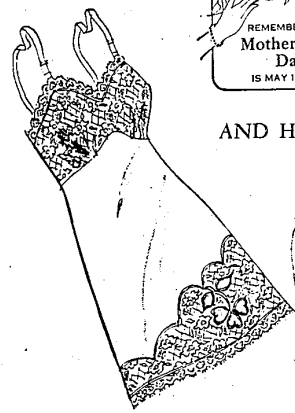

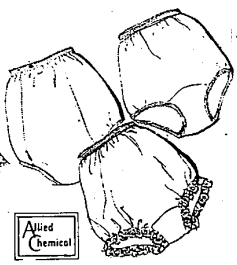

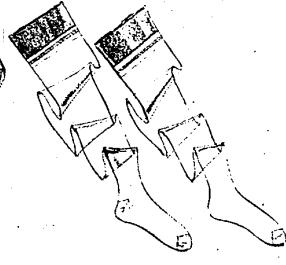

Sam Hudson has been named executive vice president and general manager of Frank Hedge, Inc., a Detroit public relations firm.

Hudson has been director of advertising and public relations at Evans Products Company's Transportation Equipment Group 1 as an account of Frank Hedge, Inc.

He replaces Richard J. Cattani, who has been appointed an editorial writer for The Christian Science Monitor in Boston.

BEFORE COMING to Michigan in 1952, Hudson held executive positions in public relations, advertising, and sales promotion in New York City with Saks Fifth Avenue, Allied Chemical and Dye Company, and the Western Electric Company.

During World War II he served in Europe with the 28th Infantry Division as an intelligence officer, retiring from the Army with rank of Captain in 1946. He and his wife, Jessie, who is head of the Art Department at Plymouth High School, reside in Plymouth Township. Their son, Bruce, is a graduate student at California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, California.

HUDSON, who holds a bachelor of commercial science degree from New York University and a master of arts degree from Eastern Michigan University, is now working toward a Ph.D degree in literature at Wayne State University.

Hudson has been a member of the board of trustees of Schoolcraft Community College since 1964. He has been a president of the Plymouth Community Fund, chairman of the Plymouth Town Hall Committee, vice president of the Plymouth Symphony Society, and is a member of the board of directors of the local Junior Achievement organization.
