

Arthur Sales 24, To Stand Drug Trial

Possession of marijuana was charged against a 24-year-old Farmington man this week when police said they found Thomas Arthur Sales allegedly growing the illegal weed in his bedroom. Sales, of 22561 Power Rd., was arraigned before Municipal Judge Michael H. Hand and after standing mute a plea of

not guilty was entered in his behalf. He was released on bond of \$1,000, with justice court examination set for June 7. The charge is a felony and Judge Hand will determine from evidence submitted at the examination whether Sales should

be bound over to Circuit Court for trial.

According to information provided by police, Sales was raising marijuana in an oblong metal planter in his bedroom. They took into possession such a planter containing 27

plants ranging up to about 12 inches in height, which they said was marijuana in its natural state.

The weed grows wild in Michigan and most other states and, as yet, no processing to be converted into cigarettes.

MOTION by Thomas, supported by Nolan, that the Township Board has declared its intention to proceed with preliminary engineering for sanitary sewers on Orchard Lake Road from Bond to vacated Washburn, and hereby directs Pate, Hirm & Bogue, Inc., registered professional engineers, to prepare plans for said area, and an estimate of the cost thereof, and when prepared to present the same to this Board, and that the plans and cost estimate for the said project be filed with the Township Clerk; and that the Township Board shall meet in the Township Hall on the 6th day of May, A.D. 1968 at 7:45 o'clock p.m. to hear and consider any objections to said special assessment district for sanitary sewer facilities, and that notice of said hearing on necessity be given by publishing and mailing such notices to each owner of or party in interest in any and all property to be assessed for said improvement. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

7. Consideration of setting a date for Public Hearing on necessary for Roads in Old Farm Colony. — MOTION by Thomas, supported by Nolan, that the Township Board has declared its intention to proceed with preliminary engineering for road improvements in Old Farm Colony, and hereby directs Pate, Hirm & Bogue, Inc., registered professional engineers, to prepare plans for said area, and an estimate of the cost thereof, and when prepared to present the same to this Board, and that the plans and cost estimate for the said project be filed with the Township Clerk; and that the Township Board shall meet in the Township Hall on the 6th day of May, A.D. 1968 at 8:15 o'clock p.m. to hear and consider any objections to said special assessment district for road improvements, and that notice of said hearing on necessity be given by publishing and mailing such notices to each owner of or party in interest in any and all property to be assessed for said improvement. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

8-A. Consideration of Bonding Resolution for SAD No. 52, Hemlock-Medbury Sewer.

MOTION by Thomas, supported by Nolan, that the Bonding Resolution for Special Assessment Roll No. 52, known as Hemlock-Medbury Sewer, in the aggregate amount of \$74,520.00 for construction of sanitary sewer facilities, be approved as presented. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

8-B. Consideration of Sale of Bonds — Eastfield.

MOTION by Thomas, supported by Nolan, that sale of bonds for Eastfield sewers, SAD No. 43, be set for May 8th, A.D. 1968 at 9:00 o'clock p.m. Roll Call Vote: 6 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried-unanimous.

9. Consideration of Bids — Re: Cars for Police and Motor Pool.

MOTION by Nolan, supported by Skilman, that bids for Police and Motor Pool cars be referred to Committee on Vehicles for study and recommendation, and that Clerk be authorized to purchase cars as recommended. Carried-unanimous.

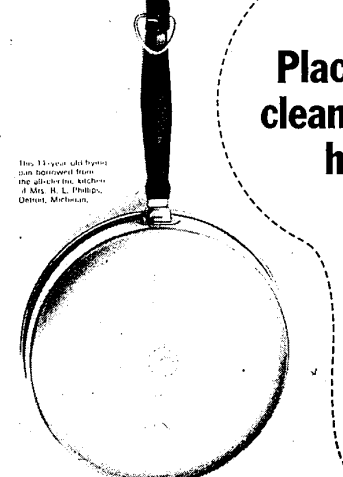
