

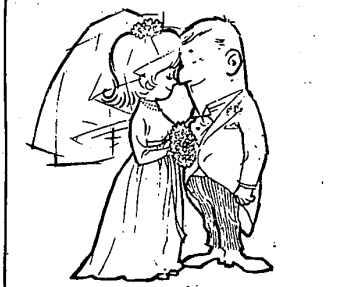
Carnival Slated May 17

Township Youth Dies In Viet

Funeral services for Farmington Township youth who was killed as a result of enemy action in South Vietnam May 7 will be held following arrival of his body at home, family sources said this week.

Spec. 4 Russell J. Heliker, 21, of 36360 14 Mile Rd., had been in Vietnam only six and a half months when he was killed in the fighting near Saigon.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard C. Heliker, have not been advised of any details beyond the bare fact of their son's death.

Heliker was graduated from Walled Lake High School in 1966 and he entered the Army last May. He received his basic training at Fort Knox, Ky., and then took advanced infantry training at Ft. McClellan, Ala., before being shipped to Vietnam.

Besides his parents, Heliker is survived by four sisters, Connie, Faye, and Charlotte, all at home, and Mrs. Sharon Leach, Detroit, a brother, Richard Jr., of Walled Lake, and two grandmothers, Mrs. Elizabeth Heliker, of Walled Lake, and Mrs. Charlotte Banfield, of Wixom.

Baker Is 'Hills' Speaker

Republican State Representative Raymond Baker (64th District) will discuss "Current Legislation" at the May 20 meeting of the Republican Women's Organization of Farmington Hills.

The Farmington Hills organization is one of two ladies GOP groups in the area. The other group, the Republican Women's Organization of Farmington, has the recognition of the Michigan Federation of Republican Women's Clubs and the 19th District GOP organization headed by John Cartwright.

The split in the area GOP is reflected by the two district conventions staged. The second convention was held by a group headed by Christian Powell.

Many of the members of the Farmington Hills organization are involved in the Powell group.

A highlight of the convention of the Cartwright group was the reading of a letter from the area legislators—Baker included—citing that organization as the "official" Republican group in the district.

Baker's talk will begin at 1 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Ray Eichler of 34702 Nine Mile Rd., Farmington. A business meeting beginning at 12 noon precedes the talk.

Spess Goes To Jail In Drake Rd. Battle

contains it's his driveway.

Oakland Circuit Court Judge William J. Beer issued an injunction naming Drake Rd. as a public right of way. Spess contends that the injunction is illegal and that neither the county nor the township has any jurisdiction over the roads.

Spess, who had requested a jury trial on the charge but waived that right, had no attorney. He told the court that "I told you before that if you want to play games with me you furnish me an attorney."

Walters ruled that the justice court was under no obligation to furnish an attorney in the matter.

Charging "harassment" by both the township and the county, Spess repeated his oft-stated contention that neither governmental unit had any jurisdiction over the road, but never denied that he had dumped logs, a stove and other materials across the road on the date of April 3.

Arthur Mays of 20930 Drake Rd., who signed the complaint, testified that he saw Spess haul logs on to the road with his tractor on that date.

IN HIS OWN defense Spess cited John F. Kennedy's inauguration address of "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country."

Spess pointed out that he built the road 43d maintained it. "There is not a penny of tax money in that road or Fend Rd., which is also a private road," he contended. "It's a private easement, but the county is attempting to get another easement they can't get out Gill Rd."

"Fend Rd. is the only road in the township that you can get in and out of in any type vehicle no matter what the weather," he added in reference to his basic premise that the county has no jurisdiction over the road and should not maintain it.

IN ADDITION to the jail sentence Walters also fined Spess \$100 plus court costs. The judge told Spess that he had the opportunity to file an appeal on the decision within the next 10 days. Spess asserted that he would do so.

Before handing down the sentence, Walters told Spess that Judge Beer had declared the stretch of road as a public road. "and the judgment stands."

"This matter has been before the court on many occasions," Walters continued, "and I am very much afraid that someone is going to hurt simply trying to use a public right of way."

"I think you would beat peace with yourself," he told the defendant. "If you would accept that this is a public right of way, and let the few people who live in the area use the road in peace."

Spess told the court that he would never accept that point of view. "I have been harassed for more than 22 years over this driveway which has already cost more than \$200,000," he asserted.

time basis. Neither, however, has yet resumed their seats at the township board table.

The township officials will be elected for two year terms, while the trustees are elected for four year terms. Because the terms are staggered neither Trustee Thomas Nolan nor Trustee Peter Klapp are up for election.

In order to qualify for the ballot Republicans must file nominating petitions with 60 signatures, while Democrats must have 56 signatures.

Deadline for filing for the August primary election is 4 p.m. June 18 in the Township Clerk's office. Nominating petitions may be obtained from the clerk's office in township hall.
