Police Outline Bicycling Rules

Farmington Township Police Chief Irving Yakes has appealed to parents of the area to help enforce safe bicycling rules among youngsters.

"The spring season naturally brings an increased use of bicycles," said Yakes, "and in many township neighborhoods which lack sidewalks the only place the kids can ride is in the streets."

"It would help reduce the traffic hazard if parents would stress good riding habits with the children. At the same time all motorists should use extra care."

Yakes outlined the following rules as the basics of safe bicycling:

1. Ride alone — only one person on a bike.

2. Yield the right-of-way to pedestrians.

3. Ride on the sidewalk when possible.

4. Keep both hands on the handlebars.

5. Ride single file, keeping close to the right hand side of the street. Ride with traffic.

6. Be alert for parked cars and opening doors.

7. Keep well back from moving cars. They may stop or turn.

8. Always stop before entering a street from a driveway or alley.

9. Show good sportsmanship to other bike riders, pedestrians and motorists.

10. Obey all traffic rules, signs and signals.

Reston To Deliver 'M' Lecture

ANN ARBOR—James Reston, newly named executive editor of The New York Times, will deliver the first annual Arthur Vandenberg Lecture at the University of Michigan on May 22.

The 8 p.m. lecture in Rackham Amphitheater is open to the public without charge.

It will deal with major problems in contemporary U.S. foreign policy, relating them to the ideas and actions of the late Sen. Vandenberg, R-Mich., who was chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in the years of reconstruction which followed World War II.

U-M Regents established the Vandenberg lectureship fund a year ago, using undesignated gifts to the university. The lecture series idea was stimulated by Arthur Vandenberg Jr.'s gift to the U-M Clements Library of some of his father's papers dealing with international relations.
