MANAGER MAYO SMITH—"If you want to be a good player, be willing to take criticism. Everyone makes mistakes. Even the great players. But only those who are willing to benefit from mistakes really ever improve."

"I have found that too many young players practice the things they do best. The good players will practice what they do worst."

TRAINER BILL BEHM — "You must be in the proper physical condition to play baseball. But also remember this — you are a ball player, not a weight lifter, so don't got extremes in your exercising. "That three parts of your body which are used the most to play baseball are your legs, arms and back. So battern your exercises to strengthen these things."

AL KALINE — "The most important thing I can say iy don't try and hit home runs! I really can't engchastze this enough. It's a natural instinct . It's foolish to swing for home runs. You're playing straight into the pitcher's hands when you try and hit the ball out of sight.

"Hitting isn't easy. All I know is that I have to work hard, day after day, week after week. A common mistake among youngsters is that they use a bat that's too heavy."

WILLIE HORTON — "The biggest mistake a young player can make is to turn his head when he's swinging. You've got to keep your head right in there so you can see the ball all the way until your bat comes in contact with! it.

"You have to use your hands more than your arms in swinging. If you use you'r arms, you'll get a sweeping swing. There won't be any snap in your swing."

EARL WILSON — "I'm sure this may sound strange, but I'm a firm believer that a young pitcher should start throwing a burve ball as soon as possible ... I think it's a mistake to wait too long, but, irankiy, I feel that you can hurt your arm just as easily throwing a last ball as throwing a curve ...
"Before I pitch I try to get away from everybody for an hour or so, just to give my entire attention to the job ahead of me."

BILL FREEHAN — "Don't be a one-handed catcher. Learn to catch the ball with both hands, even while you are warming up lon the sidelines. "When you give your pitcher, the target, don't drop it just as he's releasing the ball. That's when he needs it the most.
"Important: Let your first baseman and third baseman catch every ball they can. It's up to them to make the call."
