and meaningful."

INCUMBENT HACKETT on systems approach: "I favor it when it frees the teacher for more time with a student."

On shared governing: "I would like to see the day when the power to make decisions is equal."

Hackett also said that OCC must provide more job-oriented courses and provide ways to move the campus to the student.

MRS. FLOYD on shared governing: School boards do delegate responsibility. Some means must be provided for a guarantee of authority.

She also hit hard at board expenditures for the Orchard Ridge campus: "Money can be better spent than for gas lights. I would give no blank check to any administration. We must keep faith with the taxpayers."

Housewife Calls For Communicate-In

"We have love-ins, sit-ins, why not have a communicate-in?"

With this thought, Mrs. John J. Riordan, 32395 Leelanau, Farmington, developed an idea for an "Action Suggestion" to aid in impelling the white and black community to greater understanding and to promote the cause of non-violence.

For her idea, Mrs. Riordan also won \$50.

IT CAME about this way: Motivated by the assassination of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., the Gordon Sausage Company of Detroit, led by chairman of the Board Thomas J. Umlauf, ran a full page ad in the April 11 issue of The Michigan Catholic calling for "Action Suggestions" to promote inter-racial understanding.

The contest, open to all, was of particular interest to Mrs. Riordan because of the current emphasis on human relations by her church, Our Lady of Sorrows.

Her suggestion was so good she placed third in the contest which attracted entries from the entire metropolitan area.

As developed, the idea called for group therapy, conducted by a trained psychologist, with police and Negroes as participants. The sessions would be held at a city's time and expense and would be voluntary if possible.

MRS. RIORDAN says she was surprised that her suggestion won a prize. She comments, "My suggestion is not for any kind of immediate action—it would be a long, quiet process.

"When you carry on this sort of conversation your hidden prejudices and behavior patterns come to the surface and can be recognized," she notes.

She sums up, "During the trouble in Memphis, I heard three different newscasters broadcast with three different views. Then the participants must have had different views. With all those different viewpoints it's no wonder there is misunderstanding."
